

OREGON'S GRADS HONOR GUESTS AT HOME COMING

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., Nov. 9.—(Special)—The University of Oregon Homecoming will this year display primarily the spirit of welcome to the alumni, rather than one of the rivalry with the Aggies. "We want the grads to come back to see the university and not the game alone," declared James W. Leake, chairman of the Homecoming directorate. "The graduates of Oregon belong to a group of people who are something in common, and they will have a good time no matter how old they may be."

The program will include a torchlight parade, heave-and-drum ceremony, bonfire, rally, smoker, alumni meeting, campus luncheon, Oregon O. A. C. game, alumni dance, Mortar Board break fast, and vesper services. Although most of these are held annually, it is the aim to present them this year in a manner entirely out of the ordinary. The rally will go back 35 years in its character, and will be the peopled in history according to Leake. A smoker in the men's gym will follow and will consist of boxing, wrestling and speeches.

The campus luncheon also will be revised. If the weather permits, it will be held outside, and each thereon the old campus will be the meeting place of five classes, and the alumni can go to their trees and meet old classmates and friends.

At 2:30 p. m. Sunday, vesper services will be held in the Music building. A special program has been arranged by John Stark Evans, assistant dean of music; and Right Reverend Walter T. Sumer, Episcopal bishop of Oregon, will deliver the address.

ARMISTICE DAY GAME VITAL ONE FOR SALEM HIGH

Next Wednesday afternoon, Armistice Day, the Salem high school football team will clash with their old rivals, Eugene, on Sweetland field, as part of the armistice day program which is being sponsored by Capital Post, No. 9, of the American Legion. Salem has gone through the season with only one defeat so far, that at the hands of the Chemawa Indians, who have one of the best teams in years.

Salem will have their two toughest games of the season when they meet the Eugene team and Corvallis on November 21. By way of comparison between Corvallis and Salem, Chemawa beat The Dalles 13 to 6, Salem 29 to 7. The Dalles and Corvallis tied 6 to 6.

The Chemawa game with the locals was the first real struggle of the season for the Red and Black eleven, however.

Eugene is reported as having a fast, zappy team with an aerial attack that is almost impossible to stop. In several of their games so far this season the locals have seemed to be rather weak in both departments of the passing so will have to strengthen considerably if they expect to come out with the long end of the score. The locals have been handicapped to a great extent, in all of their games this year, due to the illness of several members of the first string.

SATURDAY GRID GAMES RESULT IN FEW UPSETS

Surprise in all parts of the country featured the grid games Saturday afternoon and caused upsets in all of the early season dope. Stanford, doped to be at least one touchdown better than the University of Washington, met defeat at the hands of the Huskies by a 13 to 0 score.

The northern team outplayed and outplayed the Cardinals in all departments of the game. Washington's victory gives them the right to meet the other undefeated team in the coast conference for the honors. California and Washington are scheduled to meet at Berkeley next Saturday in what is expected to be the best game of the present grid season.

The Huskies tied the Bears last year 7 to 7 and they are smarting under it yet.

O. A. C. had little difficulty in taking care of the Pacific university team, swamping them by a 56 to 0 score.

Montana made a thrilling rally in the final quarter and won from the Idaho team 29 to 14. Idaho led during most of the game. In the second half Montana scored a touchdown and tied the score at 14 all.

With just a few minutes to go Kelly, Montana quarter, broke through the Vandals' line and ran 60 yards for a touchdown.

Montana will face Southern California at Los Angeles next Saturday. Stanford and the University of California southern branch, will play at Palo Alto. College of Idaho and Gonzaga will play at Boise, Armistice day.

The big game of the day for Oregon fans will be the O. A. C. University of Oregon tilt in which the two traditional rivals will fight it out for the supremacy of Oregon at Eugene.

KEEP STATE OUT OF HYDRO GAME CUPPER WARNS

Private capital should be encouraged to develop the state's water and hydro-electric resources instead of the state's saddling upon itself millions of dollars more of bonded indebtedness in the opinion of Percy A. Cupper, former state engineer, who issued a statement on the question Saturday. He opposes the two initiative bills one by the Housewives Council of Portland and the other by the state grange.

"Will the state of Oregon bond itself to develop hydro-electric power?" asks Cupper. "Two measures which would authorize the state to do this have made their appearance. It is to be presumed that these measures will obtain the requisite number of signatures and find their way upon the ballot."

"There is in Oregon about 3,000,000 horsepower of which about 10 per cent is now developed. To put to use the undeveloped horsepower in this state will require nearly a half billion dollars."

The problem is how best to make available to the use of the public this vast natural resource. Should the state add to its already heavy bond burden to do this? Should the state issue bonds in the amount of 2 per cent of the assessed value of the state, it would probably result in the development of 100,000 horsepower with its attendant delivery costs. This would amount to about a third of the present hydro-electric development in Oregon. This would not be done in a year or two years, and perhaps not within five or even 10 years.

"If we make the most favorable assumptions that conservative business methods instead of politics would control the enterprise, power will be developed only as fast as new industries financed by private capital furnish a market for it. Past experience has demonstrated that state development of power would undoubtedly slow up the investments along these lines by private capital and turn it to other states."
