er law as reflected in the city budget. The old budget allowed only \$325 for city jail expenses. The new one proposes \$1250, an increase of \$925. This is explained by the fact that the city jail usually contains several men serving jail sentences for driving while intoxicated, and it is necessary for the city to feed them. This is mainly the reason for the big increase in city jail expense.

Library Fund Larger.—A salary increase is desired for the sanitary inspector from \$1200 to \$1500 a year. Additional fire hydrants to be installed as they are needed make necessary more money for that purpose, so \$7250 is proposed as against \$4625 in the old budget.

AUTO OWNERS ASKED TO GIVE NO FREE RIDES

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 10.—The Omaha street railway company is appealing in newspaper advertisements to automobile owners not to offer lifts to persons awaiting trams on street corners.

"Picking up prospective street car patrons by courteous automobile drivers reduce the operating income of the street car company and that affects the necessary rate of fare," the company's ad, headed "Unfair Competition," asserted.
