

DAIRY MARKET PRICES STEADY; EGGS STRONGER

Portland, Ore., Nov. 10.—(A.P.)—The local dairy market continues to mark time with all lines generally steady at current levels. Receipts are only moderate and trading shows a good healthy tone.

In the egg division prices are steady, the only change for the day being a cent advance in fresh under-sized or pullet eggs to the 23 cent level. Fresh standard extras still maintaining the 55 cent top.

Butter also showing a steady tone with a half cent advance in cube firsts to 47 1/2 cents, the first change in several days. Fat prices have slipped up to 56 cents f. o. b. shippers track without any definite advance having been announced. Fats delivered Portland are holding 59 cents.

The cheese situation remains firm with the trade having trouble in getting their orders filled on Tillamook and Melowet. Prices are unchanged.

The local turkey market is generally unchanged but with a strong undertone showing. Receipts are light now and are expected to fall way short of the holiday requirements. Buyers are securing the country now trying to get their needs lined up. Today live turkeys sell at 30 cents to 32 cents with dressed turkeys ranging from 38 to 41 cents. The higher figure is obtained on heavy toms weighing around 12 pounds.

Retail dealers were scouring the street for poultry this morning but offerings were light and quickly absorbed. With a few exceptions a semi-holiday there was a brisk call for roasting hens and springs. Prices are firm at current levels.

Country dressed meats remain low. Choice light hogs are selling now at 15 to 15 1/2 cents a lb. a full cent lower than the close last Saturday. Choice light calves barely holding at 14 1/2 to 15 cents. Receipts are not heavy but the demand is very slow.

PRUNE GROWERS FAIL TO MODIFY CONTRACT FORM

The amendments to the by-laws of the California Prune and Apricot Growers Association, which were submitted to a referendum vote of the members a few days ago, received a majority of the vote cast but did not get the approval of two-thirds of the membership as required to make them effective without further action, according to statement made public by J. O. Hayes, who is the chairman of the reorganization committee of the Association, say the California Fruit News. Mr. Hayes advises that the vote on the proposal to give members of the Prune and Apricot Association the option of withdrawing during the period from March 15 to 31 next year by giving notice properly for that purpose was 2,228 for the proposal and 2,108 against the proposal. The vote on the proposal to abolish the voting board and divide the State into districts for the election of directors specifically for each district resulted in 2,959 for the proposal and 1,057 against the proposal. The total number of votes cast was 4,358 out of about 11,000 members of the association. Neither of the proposals receiving a favorable two-thirds of the total membership of the Association, as required to make the changes effective, the proposals will be considered by the semi-annual meeting of the voting board to be held in San Jose on November 11. The question is whether the voting board will consider the referendum vote sufficiently representative to justify it in adopting the changes.
