11,600 REGISTER AT CHAMPOEG IN SEVEN MONTHS

That 30,000 visitors will go to historic Champeog park in Marion county during 1926 and 50,000 in 1927, are estimates of Albert Tozier, caretaker of the park, in a personal letter to Carlo Abrams, secretary of the state board of control. From April 7 to November 1, this year, says Mr. Tozier, 11,600 visitors were at the grounds.

Mr. Tozier has loaned a library and a number of relics to the building and visitors, he says, appreciate them highly. The road into the park is reported to be the best in history and the heaviest automobiles are able to get in. By a little work, says Mr. Tozier, seating capacity can be furnished for 500 people. The seating capacity at the grounds is less than 700 and 3000 persons attended the exercises there on May 2, 1925. He predicts the attendance will be 5000 in May, 1926.

"As for a job," writes Mr. Tozier, "this place does not appeal to me, but its historical relations to the state, the northwest and the nation does. That is why I am so interested. The pioneers who kept the Oregon country a part of the United States deserve a nation's blessing. In congress from Oregon are two sons of pioneer parents, and in the United States senate are two, all fine fellows, and it certainly will be a pleasure to them to ask the nation to do something for this neglected spot when their native state shows an inclination to bring provisional government meeting place to the attention of the country. Provisional government park should not be closed to a soul who wishes to see the spot where a nation received at the hands of Oregon pioneers an empire. Here is where a band of pioneers plead with the United States to extend a protecting hand while far beyond the Rockies such influence as the New York Christian Advocate, Daniel Webster, a United States senator, and E. D. Baker, who later became one from Oregon, were using their influence in 1841 against the wishes of the Oregon pioneers. This is history and fact. A few of the 1844 Oregon pioneers survive. Their descendants are legion. They are appealing to Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and the United States to do something more for provisional government park."
