

GIRL PRODIGY'S POEMS HER OWN SAY DEFENDERS

New York, Nov. 11.—(A. P.)—In proceedings attributed by associates to unwarranted doubts of her ability, a new guardian has been appointed for Nathalia Crane, 12-year-old Brooklyn poetess, who has published three volumes and gained world wide recognition as a prodigy.

"This move in court," said Mr. Crane, "followed the visit to our home of two Brooklyn newspaper women. One of the women waved one of Nathalia's books in her face and challenged her authorship of it declaring that a child of her age could not have written it. The woman descended to know who was the author."

"Nathalia made this reply to her questioner: 'I do write my poems, every word of them, and when I don't know a word I want, I look it up.'"

Thomas Seltzer, publisher of the poems, scoffed at doubt upon the authorship.

"I am ready to swear," he said "that Nathalia's work is just as much her own authorship as the poems credited to Byron are his. Many of Byron's poems were written when he was very young."

Nathalia's first two volumes, "The Janitor's Boy" and "Lava Lane" have puzzled educators, psychologists and publishers by the profound knowledge of humane nature shown in them.

RHINELANDER'S COLORED BLOOD CHARGES TRUE

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Counsel for Mrs. Alice Jones Rhinelander, now being sued for annulment of her marriage to Leonard Kip Rhinelander, on the ground of fraudulent representation of her race, has admitted in open court that their client had some colored blood.


The admission was made by Lee Parson Davis, chief of defense counsel at the opening of his outline of what the defense expects to prove. He said: "The defense counsel hereby withdraws the previous denial as to the blood of this defendant and for the purpose of this trial and to shorten the trial admits that the defendant has some colored blood."

Davis then asked Supreme Court Justice Morschauer to instruct the jury to disregard that portion of the outline of the plaintiff's case made yesterday by Isaac N. Mills, which referred to the mental development of young Rhinelander. He also objected to the portion Mr. Mills outlined which cast reflections on the "good name" of the defendant. Justice Morschauer refused to instruct the jury on these points, holding that they were relevant.

Mr. Davis contended that it was young Rhinelander's father, Philip Rhinelander, who was behind the annulment suit. "The Rhinelander millions," he said, "not Leonard's but Philip's, are back of this move to crush a concededly humble family to save what they consider to be an ancient name, trailing back to the Huguenots of New Rochelle."

BLIND SPECIALIST HONORED

Chicago, Nov. 11.—(A. P.)—Blind for 59 of his 71 years, but despite the handicap a winner of a place as an authority on heart and lung diseases, Dr. Robert H. Babcock, noted Chicago specialist, tonight will be honored by 150 of his colleagues. He has practiced here for 42 years.

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FORMER BANK RUNNER BECOMES PRESIDENT

Washington, Nov. 11.—(A. P.)—Robert V. Fleming, who entered the service of the Riggs National bank as a runner, today became president of the institution, one of the largest in the east, at the age of 35 years. He succeeds Milton E. Allen, who died here several days ago and rose from the position of a janitor in the treasury to that of a financial leader in the capital.

RUSH PETITION FOR NEW ROAD TO SILVER FALLS

Sam Matheny, who grows 50 acres of strawberries in the Silver Creek falls country, was before the county court again Tuesday with a delegation in regard to improvement of the south road to the falls from Union hill schoolhouse, which they say can be put on a grade to no place more than 5 per cent and do away with the present steep hills.

Matheny states that the strawberry industry in the Silver Falls country is growing by leaps and bounds and that within a mile of his place over 225 acres are already in strawberries and producing heavily. He says that the fern in the country, rather than being a detriment is a help, as he states the roots loosen up the ground in such a manner as to be even more effective than tile drainage.

He states that opening of the proposed new road he knows will be followed by immediate development of a large amount of productive land now lying idle because of lack of road facilities.

RECOMMEND CURB ON RADIO BROADCASTING

Washington, Nov. 11.—(A. P.)—Recommendation that no more licenses be given broadcasting stations until there has been a reduction in the number now in operation, was made in a resolution adopted here today by a subcommittee of the fourth annual radio conference.

SAYS WILHELM WAS URGED TO SHOULDER GUN

Munich, Nov. 11.—(A. P.)—That former Emperor William should have gone into the trenches in November, 1918, and thus saved the monarchy, is the opinion expressed by General Wilhelm Groener, who, during the closing days of the World war, succeeded General Ludendorff as quartermaster general.

"I told the emperor's adjutants at that time," said General Groener, "that his majesty should leave immediately for the front, not merely to review his troops or distribute iron crosses but to fight. It was to be no dash for death, but his majesty should go into the trenches like any common soldier, leaving it to chance whether a bullet should find him. If he fell, I said, it would constitute a national death; if he were wounded, a national sentiment would have reverted in his favor."

General Groener added that his advice was not heeded. He further said that Ludendorff told him on September 25, 1918, that peace must be made by Christmas of that year, as the German army could not possibly hold out any longer.

One of the resolutions to be proposed by the Pennsylvania delegation at the annual national convention of the American Legion in Omaha, is to provide that the annual national defense test be held on Armistice day.


