

OREGON POTATO CROP TO EXCEED YIELD LAST YEAR

The Oregon potato crop is estimated at about 4,800,000 bushels for 1925 compared with 3,780,000 bushels for last year and 4,150,000 bushels of the year before that, according to an estimate made by F. L. Kent, agricultural statistician of the department of agriculture at Portland. He states that the crop in the United States is estimated at 246,503,000 bushels as compared to 451,748,000 bushels for last year and 416,105,000 bushels for the year before that.

He presents an estimate of 5,634,000 bushels on the Oregon apple crop for 1925 as compared to 6,500,000 bushels for last year and 2,000,000 bushels for 1923. The apple crop in the United States this year is estimated at 171,000,000 bushels, as compared to 179,000,000 bushels for last year and 293,000,000 bushels for the year before that.

MARKETS QUIET OVER HOLIDAY

Portland, Ore., Nov. 11.—(A.P.)—A holiday tone prevailed in the local produce markets today, and while business is not closed absolutely tight, trading is very limited and prices on a nominal basis.

Fruit and produce firms as well as commission houses remained open until noon to take care of perishable receipts and to get out their outside deliveries. With grocery stores and meat shops closed there was little or no local trading.

The North Portland stock yards closed at 10 o'clock.

Wholesale grocers were closed throughout the day as were the banks.

Fresh egg values are materially lower today with quotations on the exchange off 1 to 3 cents per dozen. The market is weak.

Butter is steady and unchanged. Country dressed meats are slow and weak; choice veal 14 1/2 to 15 cents; choice light hogs 16 to 16 1/2 cents.

Poultry is firm with a good demand for all lines.

WHITE CARGO IS STIRRING TALE OF AFRICAN LIFE

"Men may come and men may go, but the damp rot in Africa desiccates forever," wrote Leon Gordon in parables of Tennyson, and then he shut his diary and hid away his few remaining possessions under his bunk aboard the SS Zealand bound for New York.

A year ago, with recognition as a leading actor practically in sight, Leon Gordon, who wrote "The White Cargo" coming to the Heilig theater tomorrow evening for one night, decided to establish a residence in New York and sent for his treasured odds and ends which he had left behind in Africa in a hurry to fill an American engagement. It was midnight when he opened a battered trunk in his new apartment in the West Fifties.

But to hasten the Americanization of each object he placed the contents of the trunk on a rug on which he knelt, preparatory to final arrangements. An old sun hat, lifted abruptly, yielded the diary, and as it fell to the floor it opened to the page from which is quoted the introductory sentence.

The trunk was abandoned for the diary, Gordon picked it up tenderly, as if it were something

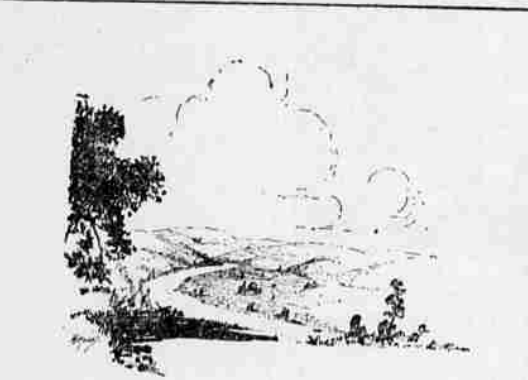
