

### ROAD DISTRICTS VOTE \$41,000 IN SPECIAL TAXES

With returns now in from 29 out of 34 road districts which voted on special tax levies last Saturday, the 29 reporting show that they voted a total of \$41,275.23 in special taxes. Three of the 29 voted against levying special taxes. Two of these declined to raise taxes aggregating \$1500 and the other failed to make a return as to the amount advanced voted on.

Last year 42 districts voted a total of \$58,299.62. Eighteen districts voted this year and there still are five to be heard from. Two more districts will hold road meetings on November 28, those being No. 16 on Howell Prairie and No. 26 near Turner. When the final result is in the special district taxes may not be far behind last year, regardless of the fewer districts voting.

It is noticeable that heavy special taxes were voted in districts where population is very sparse and voters few, but where timber holdings are heavy. For instance at Mill City \$244.70 was voted, with only six votes being cast, all in the affirmative. At Detroit \$4611 was voted with only seven votes cast, all in the affirmative. At Elkhorn \$2481 was voted with only six votes being cast, all in the affirmative. Other heavily timbered districts took the same sort of an action. The heavy expense of the tax in these districts falls on the timber companies which are absentee landlords.

### Police Seek Body of Bandit as Result of Suicide Note Found

Chicago, Nov. 13.—(A. P.)—A federal agent, who attempted to arrest him in a garage for automobile theft, October 11. The letter, containing twelve pages, expressed regret for the slayings and told of the writer's love for the month and for Mrs. Betty Werner, for whose small son he had planned "a new and clean life."

"It breaks my heart to do this thing, but I know it's much better than getting killed by the police. They would kill me even before I go to trial," the letter said.

The writer said his arm had been broken by shotgun fire and that he had a bullet in his lungs which made him think he was getting "lockjaw."

"Gimme don't pay, I see—but too late," the letter concluded.

Despite the assertion that the writer was slowly dying of a bullet wound in the lung and was desperate because he had to hide in basements and fitch food from the police, the police doubted the expressed intention to end it all in the river.

There was little doubt, though, but that the letter and clothing were genuine. The blue overcoat and a gray suit coat, bearing a Kansas City firm's label had shotgun tears through the left sleeve and dried blood on the lining. A dark dried cap was found beside the coat. All would fit a man of Durkin's build.

Durkin was thought wounded when he escaped October 29 from a police trap set in the flat of Lloyd Austin, who, with Sergeant Harry Gray, was killed in the ensuing pistol battle. Durkin previously was sought in many cities after he killed Edward Shanahan.

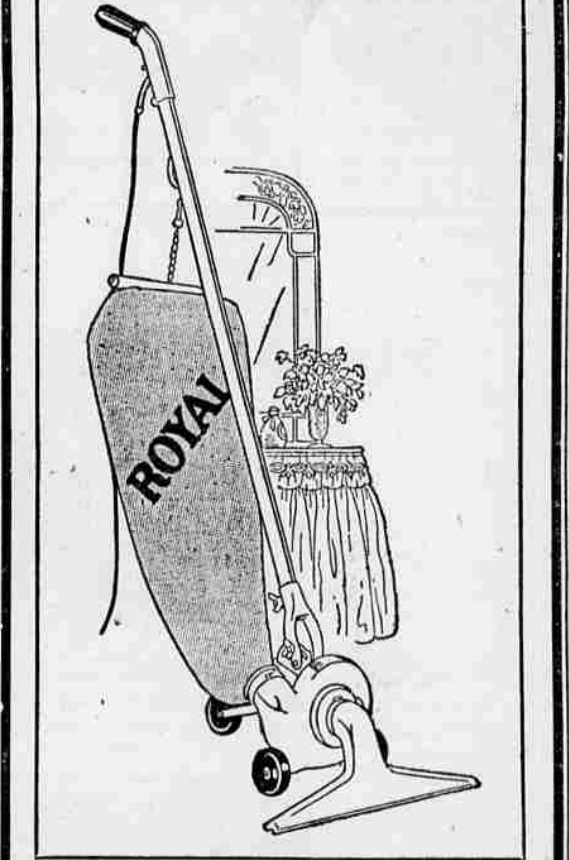
