TANNERY SEES LOCATION HERE FOR BIG PLANT (Continued from page one) The leather industry has hitherto been largely confined to the New England states and a territory tributary to Chicago where large plants are maintained and where the Pacific coast annually sends 1,200,000 skins to be 400,000 goat and sheep skins, and 450,000 calf skins to be tanned which later are returned to this territory as finished leather to the extent of \$9,500,000, the annual consumption of the coast region of special tanned hides, showing that 99 per cent of the finished leather used in the west is tanned in the east from hides originating on the coast.

The estate goes entirely to the one brother regardless of the fact that the petition for probate shows that a number of other sisters and a brother are heirs at law. The other heirs at law are Cora M. Branchflower, sister of Newbery, Emma L. Cooper, sister of Minnieville, Lula E. Wilson, sister of Portland, and Harley Massey, brother of Pondition. While what makes up the estate is not detailed in the petition, it is shown that \$5000 of it is in real property and the other \$15,000 in personal property. The will is very brief, simply devising the entire estate to the real and personal, to the one brother and naming him executor.
