CAREY TO SPEAK HERE ON MONDAY

Judge Charles H. Carey, one of Oregon's great historians, will be the speaker at the chamber of commerce luncheon Monday when he will speak on "Creation of the State of Oregon." Judge Carey not only is an attorney of wide repute, but recently completed an exhaustive history of the state of Oregon and is considered one of the leading living authorities on the subject.

The talk will be of particular interest here as Salem was the center of the beginnings of Oregon. Chamberlain is in Marion county, and the Wallace home, the first American settlement in the Willamette valley was built in 1912, just north of the deaf school, a stone's throw from the Salem city limits. The second post was also in Marion county on this side of the river near Newberg, this be-

ing established in 1814. Judge Carey will tell of these early beginnings of the state and give an insight into the various human interest features surrounding the establishment of a great commonwealth which literally had its cradle in this county.

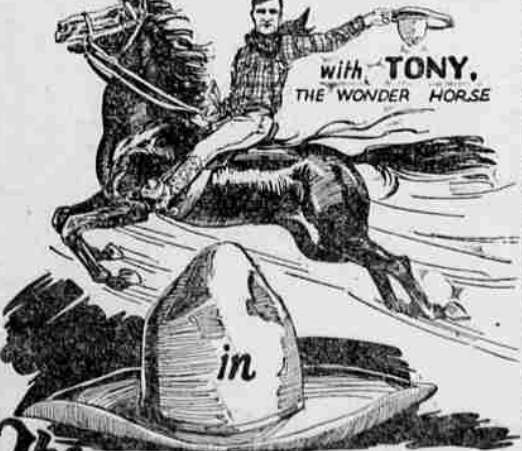

COURT MARTIAL PROBE IS ENDED

Washington, Nov. 14.—Four years and more after the inquiry was ordered, the senate at its forthcoming session is to receive a report on the investigation into the fairness of the court martial verdict dismissing from the service Captain Edmund G. Chamberlain, a flying marine corps aviator, because of his story of a sensational battle with German airplanes on the western front in 1918.

Chamberlain claiming that while on furlough he visited a British sector, obtained an airplane and while with a British bombing expedition, shot down five German planes, damaged two others and sweeping earthward in his own damaged plane, scattered a detachment of German soldiers.

On the basis of Chamberlain's story, a navy department recom-

mended him for the highest honor for gallantry and courage, the congressional medal of honor. The young officer's story soon was challenged and instead of the medal he received dismissal from the navy after a court martial in Paris and London.

The senate investigation was ordered early in 1921 on the motion of Senator Shepherd of Texas in which state Chamberlain lived.
