

TRIAL OF INDIAN WHO BURIED BABE ALIVE DELAYED

Pueblo, Colo., Nov. 17.—The trial of Platt May, Ute Indian, on a charge of murdering his 17 day old infant by burying it alive in the grave of its mother, was delayed in United States district court here today because some of the government's Indian witnesses strayed from the federal building and roamed over Pueblo.

Cass R. Herrington, Jr., and E. E. Green, defense attorneys, questioned the witnesses informally and announced that their defense would be that the medicine man and that the burial of the baby was made under Mormon Joe's orders. Mormon Joe, it has been asserted, claimed burial of the baby would restore the mother's life.

Mormon Joe, the only witness to be subpoenaed by the defense, was brought from the state penitentiary today under heavy guard. He is serving a sentence of from 25 to 30 years for the murder of a cellmate, who taunted him about the burial of the baby. At that time Mormon Joe was held on a charge of being an accessory to the killing of the infant.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—This section was visited by another slight earth tremor Monday morning similar to one felt here Saturday.
