

COUNTY COURT PREPARES FOR 1926 ROAD WORK

The county court contemplates starting in a short time on outlining its market road program for the coming year. Arrival of a warrant for \$22,000 as half of the market road fund coming to the county from the state for the past year will set the machinery in motion for outlining the program.

With the county being required to match this fund and a second installment of like amount being due from the state along in February, this will give the county about \$125,000 to work on next year for market road development from the 1-mill tax. In addition to that the county's share of the gasoline tax for the year will be about \$75,000, this also to go into the market road fund.

With over \$200,000 in sight for market road development the court will be ready to start in the spring in full swing on the first lap of its new five year program.

At the present time there seems to be in eight miles of pavement in sight which will be a virtual necessity this including two miles near Monitor, three miles near Scotts Mills and three miles near Mehama and there also will be additional paving work, although just how extensive has not been determined. It is doubtful if there will be as much pavement put down next year as this when 15 miles of county pavement were laid on county roads.

The new program will have more of an idea toward lifting the smaller communities out of the mud with good types of macadamized and gravelled roads, and some efforts at oiling in a few places as an experiment.

Numerous parts of the county not benefited at all from the market road funds under the first program will have considerable active work done during the next five years. Just which will be the first to benefit will be outlined during the coming weeks in readiness for actual work in the spring.

GRADE CROSSING PLEA ALLOWED

By an order of the public service commission, issued today, the city of Eugene is authorized to eliminate grade crossing of Blair boulevard over the Southern Pacific tracks in the northwest part of the city, one of the most heavily used crossings on the Pacific highway.

Blair boulevard is the main artery of traffic into the city from the north, and in addition to motor vehicle traffic carries the street railway line of the Southern Pacific company in Eugene.

The order points out that the city is now improving Blair boulevard, which parallels Blair boulevard and which will accommodate traffic by way of a crossing on Van Buren street, also that plans are being completed for entrance into the city by West Sixth street. The petition of the city for authority to eliminate the Blair boulevard crossing was protested by a large number of persons owning property on Blair.

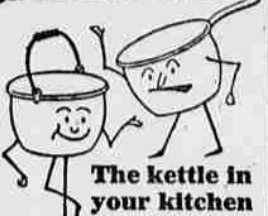
