

SCHEDULE DATE FOR DRAWINGS IN BOYS' LEAGUE

Drawings in the Anderson junior boys basketball tournament will be made Wednesday, November 25, according to an announcement made yesterday afternoon by George Cadwell and Bob Boardman, sponsors of the league.

The tournament will be open to all Salem school boys under 15 years of age or under 130 pounds. It is open to all church, Sunday school, Y. M. C. A. pioneer, comrade scout or independent teams providing they come under the weight and age limit. Each team will be limited to seven players whose name must be handed in on or before Wednesday, November 25th. Those wishing to enter the league may hand their names to Bob Boardman, athletic supervisor of the Y. M. C. A. or George Cadwell of the Anderson sporting goods store.

The regular schedule will be made up at that time and the games are scheduled to start November 27th. Members of the high school or junior high school teams are barred. The league being sponsored instead of the commercial league for the purpose of interesting as many new men as possible.

Suitable individual prizes will be given to players on the winning team. Other prizes will be given to the winners of the losers tournament. All prizes are being given by the Anderson store, which will be silver medals or buttons.

Teachers who attend the annual convention of the State Teachers' association in Portland December 29, 30, and 31 will have the opportunity to hear two educators of national reputation, according to information being sent out to the teachers of the state by E. F. Carleton, chairman of the committee on information. They are Dr. Ellwood P. Cubberley of Stanford university and Miss Mabel V. Wilson of the Seattle public schools.

The representative council will be called to order Tuesday, Dec. 29, for the transaction of association business and the general and departmental sessions will be held the two following days.

Dr. Cubberley is head of the School of Education at Stanford. He will speak Wednesday, Dec. 30, at 10 o'clock on "Why Education in America is Difficult," and on Thursday at 3 o'clock he will speak on "Nineteenth Century Forces Which Shaped the School."

Miss Wilson is serving her second year as president of the Seattle Grade club. She is known as a ready writer and able speaker and is recognized as a national leader. She will talk in the general assembly and in several of the departmental sessions.
