N.Y. Woman To Be Guest Local Branch

Marked interest is being shown in the announcement that Mrs. Caspar Whitney of New York, first vice president of the national league of women voters, and a keen student of public affairs, will be the guest of honor and speaker at a luncheon at the Gray Belle next Tuesday, November 24th, arranged by the Salem branch of the national league.

Reservations for the luncheon should be made with Mrs. J. A. Churchill, Salem league president, not later than Saturday. Additional guests at the luncheon will be Miss Heister Hollingshead, regional director, and members of the Corvallis league who have been invited to come to Salem to meet Mrs. Whitney.

On Monday Mrs. Churchill and a number of other Salem matrons prominent in the work of the league will motor to Portland to attend the tea which will be given by the Oregon branch in Mrs. Whitney's honor at the University club in Portland. Mrs. Churchill has been asked to dispense hospitalities at the tea table during the afternoon. Preceding the luncheon here on Tuesday, and beginning at twelve o'clock a business meeting will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms with Mrs. Whitney meeting with the league members.

Mrs. Whitney is a pioneer in league work. She was one of the first members of the New York state league and has filled important positions in the league organization, beginning as county league chairman, then a member of the state board of directors, and before her election to the national board was vice chairman of the New York league for three years.

Organization work and citizenship schools, the latter a special feature in the league's educational program, have shared first place in Mrs. Whitney's outstanding interests. The thriving and influential New York state league is accepted as a tribute to Mrs. Whitney's organizing ability.

Mrs. Whitney has an interesting wartime record. When the war broke out in 1914 she was made chairman of the woman's division of the Hoover committee for Belgian relief which had been organized by the chamber of commerce of Los Angeles. Afterward she went abroad with Mr. Whitney who was sent into Belgium by the relief committee. Mrs. Whitney immediately became associated in England with the French wounded emergency fund which was distributing hospital supplies to the poorer French hospitals. She returned to this country in 1916 and at once devoted her time to war work here. She helped organize the national league of women's service and later was the chairman of the New York branch.

ADOBE CAKE

(Two-layer Cake)
3/4 cup fine granulated sugar
1/2 cup Snowdrift
3 egg yolks
1 cup moderately strong coffee
2 1/2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cocoa
1 teaspoon mixed spices
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
3 egg whites well beaten

Cream Snowdrift and sugar, and add yolks of eggs and beat until light and creamy. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, cocoa, spices and pepper. Add to the creamed mixture alternately the dry ingredients and coffee. Beat the whites last and add, folding and cutting in only enough to incorporate with the batter. Pour the batter into pans, the sides and bottom of which have been oiled with Snowdrift and flour sifted over the Snowdrift. Bake the batter up to the sides of the pan, leaving a depression in the center, so that when the cake rises, the top will be absolutely flat. Bake in oven 350 degrees F. for twenty-eight minutes. At 4,000 degrees altitude (or over) reduce sugar by 1/4 cup and baking powder to a teaspoon.
