City Engineer Seeks Expert to Open Safe; Prison Out Just Now

The safe in the Salem city engineer's office, containing records that are constantly needed by city officials, has been locked for several days and neither City Engineer Hugh Rogers nor Harold Davis, his assistant, can unlock it. Inquiry for safety lock experts has been made at the state penitentiary and in Portland, but so far no one has come to the relief of the city engineering department.

"We've got two men here who open safes, but they use powder," Deputy Warden Little at the state prison answered in response to the inquiry.

The engineer's office hasn't been in the habit of using the combination lock, but someone evidently has known the combination. It is locked fast, and no one in the office knows the combination.

Lenape's deck when the rescue craft came alongside. The crew swarmed over the Clyde liner's smoking rats, fought their way to passengers who had been cut off in the interior of the ship and dragged them to the sides. Lines were attached to them and they were ordered to jump. From shore they could be discerned dangling over the water as the lifeboats and other craft ran up under the Lenape's blazing stern to pick them up.

"The crew did a good job in fighting the fire, particularly in the engine room men," said James Hanner of the New York city fire department, passenger. "The men were filled with smoke." Chief Engineer J. J. Gaudet said the bulkheads were red hot while members of the engine room crew were fighting the flames.

John Shimko of New York, said the alarm of the fire was given after 11 o'clock, the passengers being told to dress at once. There was little excitement, he said, but members of the crew went among the passengers re-assuring them. The work of the captain and the officers was particularly commendable, Shimko said. He added that as he was being taken off in a boat to the pilot boat after the Lenape had reached the breakwater, he saw a man leap from the blazing ship. A motorboat rescued him.

George Suffingham, New York, said about 40 of the passengers and crew were left on the ship after all lifeboats were filled to capacity and had pulled away. "There was no help in sight and we thought it was all over when the pilot boat Philadelphia came over and took us off," he said.

"Another fool" is the reason given on the police report by J. R. Smith for his automobile being struck by another, driven by an unidentified driver 4 1/2 miles north of Salem on the Pacific highway. The remark has reference to the other driver, whom Smith designates as "Hit and Run." He claims the other motorist cut to the left side of the road, struck his car and kept on going.
