

EUGENE WOMAN RAILROADED TO ASYLUM, CLAIM

Charging that Professor J. E. Johnson, member of the faculty at the University of Oregon, has been too hasty in having his wife committed to the state hospital for the insane and that she should not have been sent to the institution, a delegation from Eugene appeared before Superintendent R. E. Lee Steiner and his assistant, Dr. L. F. Griffith, yesterday to protest the commitment. Mrs. Johnson was received at the hospital Tuesday of this week.

Universally faculty members and neighbors of the Johnsons were in the delegation of half a dozen persons, including Dean Eric Allen of the college of Journalism.

The Johnsons are said to be newcomers at the university and to have come from England. Statements made at the hearing yesterday indicated that Professor Johnson is 13 years younger than his wife.

Mrs. Johnson came to the hospital under a regular commitment from the Lane county court.

"Of course we do not know at present whether or not the commitment was legally obtained," said Dr. Steiner. "The case will be handled by us as all cases are. Mrs. Johnson is under observation and will be for some time. At present I have nothing to say about Mrs. Johnson's condition. The delegation from Eugene came in good faith, and, I think, went away satisfied that justice will be done as far as the hospital is concerned."

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MAN WANTED IN POLK MAY FACE FEDERAL COURT


Dallas, Or., Nov. 19.—John L. Ford, for whom a justice court warrant was issued on October 1 on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, has been arrested in Oakland, Cal., according to a telegram received by Sheriff Hooker, Wednesday. It is probable that Ford's case will be handled by the federal authorities under the Mann act and not returned here.

Ford, who was a transient employed in the hop picking season, is alleged to have induced a young Monmouth girl to run away from home and accompany him. They left September 29 and have since been traced at various points through southern Oregon. They later crossed into California. It is understood that the girl was picked up at the same time as Ford and is being held as a witness.

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Sea Biscuit 76 Years Old Shown Here

When G. Sherwood of South Commercial street the other day found a chunk of bread 27 years old, this was considered some record for bread.

But John M. Bigler, 946 South Liberty street, has a sea biscuit which makes the Sherwood bread seem like a mere infant.

The sea biscuit in question was brought across the ocean to this country in 1849 by Grandma Farrar, grandmother of Postmaster John Farrar and mother of Squire Farrar, formerly postmaster here for many years.

Mrs. Farrar preserved the sea biscuit until her death. Following that Lizzy, her daughter, presented it to Mrs. Bigler as a memento of her mother. For the past 30 years the sea biscuit has been hanging by a ribbon on a wall in the Bigler home.

Before the wheat had been planted which made the flour which made the Sherwood bread, the Farrar biscuit was hanging on the wall in the Bigler home, at Mrs. Bigler. The sea biscuit looks as young and fresh as it must have looked when Grandma Farrar took it from the table on the ship in which she crossed the ocean over 76 years ago. It is barely possible that at that time the sea biscuit had put a few years behind it.

The Dates, Or., Nov. 18.—Mrs. Mary Cushing, said to be the oldest resident of eastern Oregon, died here yesterday. She was 93 years old and had been a continuous resident of this section for 75 years. She was the widow of Milo M. Cushing, who built the first hotel in eastern Oregon.
