

Principal Awards In Corn Display Won By Wiesner and Hughes

Award for the best 50 ears of yellow dent corn at the Marion-Polk corn show went to E. G. Wiesner of Gervais and A. E. Hughes of Woodburn took sweepstakes for the best 10 ears of corn in the show. This year is one of the best exhibits of corn yet seen and it is conceded on every hand that the corn shows have demonstrated beyond any doubt whatever that Marion and Polk counties will hold their own anywhere as corn growing sections. It was not such a great while ago that corn growing in this country was laughed at as a doubtful possibility.

The corn show is up to and beyond past years in everything but attendance. Only a slim crowd went by the booths last night and before 10 o'clock, closing time, the armory was nearly cleared out. Bigger crowds are expected today and tomorrow, although they must be bumper one to reach the record attained last year.

Prize awards given on corn and special crop exhibits are as follows:

For the ten best ears of yellow dent corn, Gilbert Donker, Aumsville, first prize; Claire Donker of Aumsville, second prize and E. G. Wiesner of Gervais, third prize.

For the best 50 ears of Yellow Dent, E. G. Wiesner of Gervais, first prize, George Wiesner of Gervais second prize, and Dean Schaap of Gervais, third prize.

For the best ten ears of White Dent, A. E. Hughes of Woodburn, first prize; Harley Hughes of Woodburn, second prize and Harry Hughes of Woodburn, third.

For the best ten ears of Flint corn, Ray Miller of Monmouth, first and second, and W. H. Ray of Monmouth, third.

For the best 50 ears of Flint corn, W. H. Ray of Monmouth, first and Ray Miller second.

For the best ten stalks of silage corn (stalks and ears) Harry Hughes of Woodburn, first; Har-

ley Hughes of Woodburn, second and A. E. Hughes of Woodburn, third.

For the best pop corn, G. C. Bolter of 2016 Trade, Salem, first; R. D. Hulse of Salem, route 1, second and Mrs. Lee Cooley of Jefferson, third.

In the sweepstakes, A. E. Hughes of Woodburn took the prize for the best ten ears of corn in the show, and E. G. Wiesner of Gervais took the prize for the 50 best ears of corn in the show.

In the boys' and girls' club department for the best ten ears of any variety, George Wiesner of Gervais placed first and Norval Pease of Independence, second.

Mrs. O. B. Miles of Salem exhibited the tallest hill of corn with roots attached. The largest hill was grown by C. T. Hughes of Woodburn.

Mr. Ludwig of Marion exhibited six large potatoes. The total weight of the six is 14 pounds and 4 ounces.

The largest mangel beets were submitted by J. A. Ziellnack of Salem, route 1, the three beets he exhibited weigh a total of 51 pounds and 4.48 ounces.

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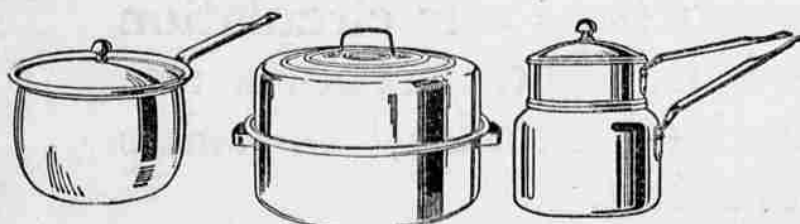
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VAN DUZER TO SPEAK BEFORE DALLAS CLUB

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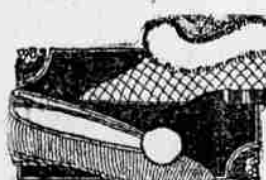

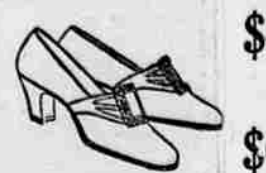

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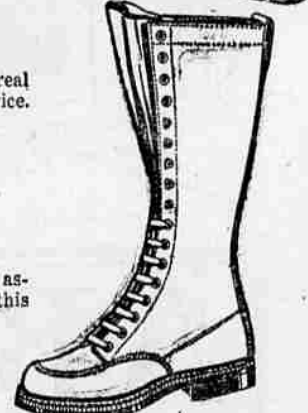
