

WHEAT ADVANCE SENDS FLOUR UP; BUTTER STEADY

Portland, Ore., Nov. 20.—The local egg market is generally steady today at prevailing levels. A cent advance in pullets to 44 cents was noted on the exchange. No change is shown in butter quotations and the market continues steady in all lines.

The continued upward trend in wheat prices during the last few days is responsible for a rise in the local flour list.

Portland millers boosted the entire list 20 cents a barrel today, bringing family patents up to the \$2.50 level on 48's. Other varieties including the advance are now quoted as follows on 55's:

Whole wheat \$3.40; graham \$2.70; rye \$2.20; bakers hard wheat \$2.80;akers bluestem \$2.90 and pastry \$2.50 per barrel.

The advance in flour brought the price of millfeed up \$1 a ton with millrun now listed at \$28 and middlings \$26. Scratch feed and grain have not yet advanced but higher prices expected before the day is over.

Receipts of turkeys in the local market were very light today and prices were firm to a shade higher. Dealers and commission men expect heavy run tomorrow and Sunday. Houses will remain open Sunday to take care of shipments coming in.

Heavy buying of retail dealers are expected to reach the peak Sunday or Monday. So far it has been limited.

Quality of birds coming in so far has been exceptionally high.

Country dressed hogs are weak and lower with 16 cents, the top today on choice light pork. Country dressed veal is about steady at 15 1/2 cents.

GROWERS BLOCK WOOL ACTIVITY BY HOLDING OUT

Boston, Mass., Nov. 20.—(A.P.)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The market is less active due to the narrowing supply of stocks and, possibly, to some extent, to the rise in prices recently. Prices, however, are fully firm and the tendency must still be said, to be against the buyer. The goods market is steady."

"The first fall Texas offering at San Angelo Tuesday resulted in no sale, all bids being rejected. Some wool is reported sold privately, bids ranging from 33 to 39 cents, according to the wool. Scattering buying is reported at other western points at about eastern market parity."

"The foreign markets have been a bit irregular in some instances, notably at the Melbourne sale and in South Africa, where the second crop and ordinary wools were slightly easier."

"Mohair is steady and unchanged."

OREGON CELERY FOR COOLIDGES' TURKEY DINNER

Brooks, Nov. 20.—Two crates of Oregon's choicest celery, the gift of the Labish Meadows Celery Union was started by express the evening of the 17th so that it would arrive in Washington in time for Thanksgiving. TURKEY MARKET

ROSEBURG, ORE., Nov. 20.—The Thanksgiving turkey market opened today and the receipts being exceptionally light. The market opened at a price of 41 cents, which quickly went to 42 cents as the birds started coming in. With the number of birds very small, competition forced the price upward to 43 cents shortly after 10 a. m. but it was thought probable that this price would not hold. Buyers are apparently trying to keep the price under the 43 cent mark, while growers are holding out for a better price. Only birds in prime condition are being brought in for the Thanksgiving trade, those which will put on weight between now and Christmas time being held for the holiday market.

Of the 300 cars shipped from this district during the season many went directly into celery growing country which considers the freight value that forms the largest competitive factor still made a profit to the growers and tells its own story as to condition and quality. Demands for it come from as far places as New York, Montreal, Chicago and even south to Maryland and Florida.

An increased acreage amounting to near 100 cars will be necessary to take care of the demand anticipated.
