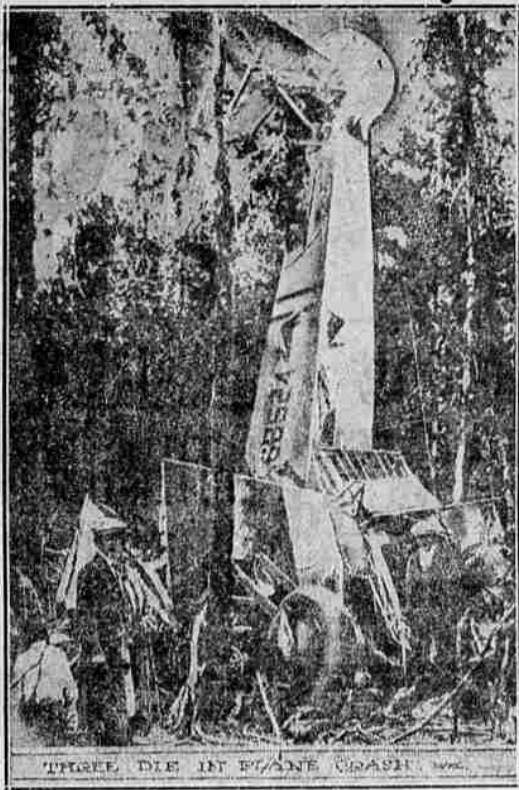
BUSINESS MEN FROM PORTLAND ARE HERE TODAY
