

15-Year-Old Theatre Program Recalls Old Order to Play Goers

Fifteen years may be only a day to May Robson, but fifteen years have meant many changes to Salem as an examination of a fifteen-year-old theater program proves. Fifteen years ago this season May Robson made her first appearance in Salem at the "Grand Opera House." On Wednesday evening she played in the same theater, now the Hollig, in a brand new play. A Salem woman who saw her fifteen years ago showed the famous comedienne the program of her first play here. "That was only yesterday," said the famous May.

The little eight-page program contains advertisements of many firms that are dead and gone and almost forgotten in the fifteen years of "yesterdays" that have elapsed. John F. Cordray, who before his death became one of the best known theater men in the northwest, was manager of the Grand opera house then. Ray Farmer was local manager, L. C. Farmer, advertising manager, and Roy Phillips the stage manager.

Just above the cast of characters in the 1910 program are the printed rules of the house. Among them are the following:

"Eating peanuts not allowed in the theater."
"Curtain rises at 8:15. Matinee 2:15. Order carriages for 10:25."

"No intoxicating liquors of any kind permitted about this theater."
"Please report at the box office any inattention or incivility of ushers or any other employe of this theater. The management will consider this a favor as the principle of the house is to please, not to offend."

Fifteen years ago marcelled were unheard of and Turkish baths had not been exploited. Beauty parlor ads in the program boasted of their "hair weaving," that they gave bake even baths and did chiropodist work. The little ads

had cuts of pained looking women with coils and coils of hair piled nearly a foot high—a far cry from the shingled head of today.

Among the firms flourishing fifteen years ago, according to the program, and gone today were the Yokohama Grocery & Tea company, Watt Shopp Sporting Goods store, the Oregon Shoe company, the Elite Cafe (that W. A. Irwin owned on Commercial street, Powers jewelry store in the then "new Bligh block," the Capital Bakery, Elite Massage & Beauty Parlors in the U. S. bank building, Miss Ora Poage Beauty Parlors, the Toggery on North Commercial street, Salem Steam Laundry and Oscar Johnson, who had a clothing store on State and Liberty streets.

HUNDREDS KILLED IN STORM ON INDIA COAST

Bombay, British India, Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—The loss of life in the cyclonic storm which swept the coast of India last week is now estimated at 700 and the damage at 100,000,000 pounds sterling. The Malabar coast west especially hard hit. The storm was the most severe experienced in India within memory.

First reports from Madras on November 13, said it was feared sixty fishing boats had been lost. The storm caused floods inland and impeded communications.

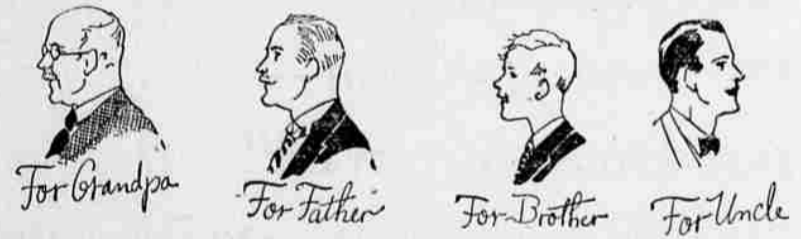
