COUNTY HEALTH COUNCIL FORMED

At a meeting held Saturday afternoon at the chamber of commerce of delegates from all parts of the county from organizations interested in the work of the Marion County Child Health Demonstration, a county council was organized with the election of the following officers: president, T. M. Hicks, vice president, Mrs. Waldo Brown of Hubbard; secretary, Mrs. Roy Burton of Salem.

The county council, with a representative from each locality and county wide organization, will act in an advisory capacity with the Marion County Child Health Demonstration of which Dr. Walter H. Brown is director.

In addition to the county council, there has already been organized local councils in each community which will co-operate with the demonstration in the health work to be done in each community.

At the meeting Saturday afternoon, several delegates reported on the progress of the health work in their own communities.

Dr. Walter H. Brown, director of the demonstration, Elvora E. Thomson, director of nursing and Dr. Stella Ford Warner, director of medical services, each spoke at the Saturday meeting, each giving an account of the different kinds of health work now being done in the county under the direction of the Marion County Child Health Demonstration.

When matters of general county interest are to be discussed, delegates will meet at the call of the president, T. M. Hicks.

SALEM BOYS ON DEBATING TEAM

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Nov. 23.—Thomas Childs and Howard C. Page of Salem were selected for the rook debate team from 30 candidates at the largest tryout ever held at the Oregon Agricultural college. There are 16 men on the freshmen team. The men chosen will form the first year squad to represent the college in intercollegiate debates. The single squad system, used by the first year men as well as the varsity, makes this tryout final for the year. From this squad a team will be picked to meet freshmen of other institutions.

Three other freshmen were chosen in addition to the first squad to represent the class in inter-class debates. Dates for contests have not been set, but arrangements are being made with the Oregon frosh, Linfield college, Willamette university and the College of Puget Sound.

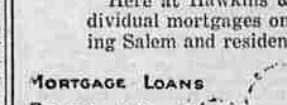
