

OREGON TO LOSE 6 VETERANS FROM FOOTBALL TEAM

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 24.—(Special)—Six veterans of Oregon grid battle will don mole skins for the last time Thanksgiving day at University of Washington in the closing encounter of the 1925 season. All are playing their third year on the squad.

The men soon to end their careers are: Captain Bob Mauts, right end; Gene Shields, left guard; Bert Gooding, right tackle; Ken Bailey, right guard; Louie Anderson, quarterback; Jackson Biles, alternate guard. Each has played two years on the Oregon team. They will leave holes hard to fill.

Lauren Reynolds, another senior, and a transfer from Whitman, will also end his gridiron career at Seattle. He has been hampered all year with injuries but is in fine fettle now. Coach Smith has been alternating him with Anderson at quarter, and is pleased with his form. He is a clever kicker.

With Oregon hopelessly out of the running this year, Smith has been experimenting with young material to use in the future. Leavitt and Dixon made their appearance in the O. A. C. game, and others will probably be used at Seattle. Riggs, Hughes, Kiminki, and Harrison may see service against the Huskies. Hughes is considered the best pass receiver on the squad.

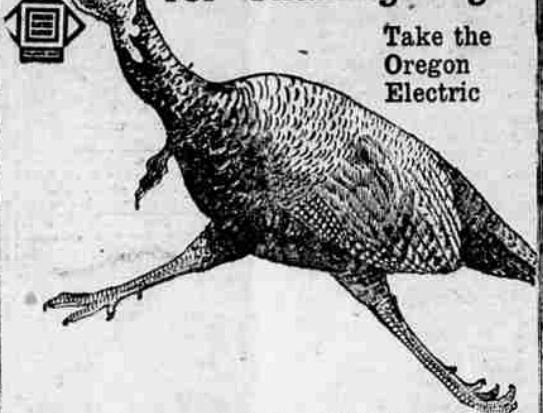
