ENDEAVORERS OF POLK CONCLUDE ANNUAL SESSION

Monmouth, Or., Nov. 24.—The annual convention of the Polk County Christian Endeavor drew to a close last night after a three-day session held at the Evangelical church at Monmouth. The presiding officers were James M. Lettich of Dallas and Mrs. C. V. Paul of Falls City. Speeches were made by Judge Jacob Kanzer of Portland, state president of the Christian Endeavor Union; Rev. L. H. Willard of Corvallis, president of the Evangelical league of Christian Endeavor of the Evangelical church in Oregon; and western Washington; Rev. W. L. Meyers of Eugene, pastor advisor of the Oregon Christian Endeavor Union; Dr. Helen Gilkey of Corvallis, a past president; Viola Ogden, executive secretary for Oregon, and Rev. L. E. Hoskins.

At the business sessions the officers were elected and installed for the ensuing year with James M. Lettich as president; Miss Gillison of Perrydale, vice-president; Miss Newgill of Dallas, secretary, and Mr. Morgan of Falls City treasurer. Catherine Sealey was chosen as county booster for the winter convention which will be held some time in April at Albany. A program was adopted to increase membership 25 per cent in the next two years and a budget was also adopted for \$75.

A good attendance was reported, the average was approximately 100, with 30 regular delegates coming from the churches of the county.


