MYSTERY FORGER LEAVES TRAIL OF GOOD BAD CHECKS

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—A mystery forger left Milwaukee last night for an unknown destination after writing one of the most unusual chapters in local police history.

Charged with forgery under the name of Peter Daly, 60, from "nowhere," he vanished under orders of Judge George A. Shaughnessy after the latter had given him a suspended sentence.

By his own admission, Daly had cashed hundreds of worthless checks in many cities but the police say never once has his intended victim been the loser. From some mysterious source every check has been paid dollar for dollar until the total has reached a tidy fortune.

Daly declared that he does not know who is picking up his worthless paper or why. He only knows, he said, that private detectives have trailed him constantly for years, never molesting him but keeping him under surveillance and paying the bad checks as fast as he passed them.

EXPERT TO PICK LINEN MILL SITE

Directors of the new Oregon Linen Mills, Inc., at a meeting yesterday afternoon at which sites were considered, decided to wire eastern experts to come to Salem at once in order to pass on proposed sites and determine on the laying out of a mill. A water analysis will be necessary, it is stated, before a site is definitely selected, as the mineral content of the water to be used must be determined. Pure water without mineral content, is demanded in the bleaching processes for the linen, it is stated, and this is a matter to give most serious consideration.

Financial conditions are such as to make it possible to go ahead with the new mill at any time, it was stated, and now all that is necessary is the working out of details in regard to location, construction and machinery. About 90 per cent on the first call on stock is reported in making selection of and payment for a right possible.

MENUS

Roast Goose With Baked Apple
8 pound goose
2 cups bread crumbs
1 chopped onion
2 tablespoons fat
3 potatoes (sweet potatoes)
3/4 teaspoon salt
Pepper to taste
6 to 8 firm tart apples
3/4 cup of brown sugar

Cook the giblets until tender and then chop and add to the stuffing made of the bread crumbs, onion, fat, salt and pepper. Roast slowly for 3 hours. Wash and core the apples, sprinkle with sugar and stuff with the 3 potatoes, cooked and mashed (not too moist). Bake until tender and serve hot with the goose.

1 tablespoon butter

1/2 lemon
1 tablespoon parsley
Salt
Toast
Drain and wash oysters. Add the juice of the lemon and the parsley to the oysters and turn into the melted fat. Leave in this fat only until oysters are plump and gills are a little ruffled. Season with salt and pepper and serve on toast.

Volcano Potatoes
Shape mashed potatoes into irregular cone shapes about 3 inches high, and place in double compartment vegetable dish. Make deep indentations in the top of each volcano. Mix 4 tablespoons grated cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Fill these indentations with this mixture, sprinkle grated cheese lightly over the tops and bake 10 minutes at 400 degrees F.


Fluffy Biscuits

"Fluffy" is just the name for these lovely, light biscuits. A recipe which will interest particularly women who are attending the Edison Electric Cooking School this week.

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons Crisco
3/4 cup milk, or half milk and half water

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add Crisco and mix in very lightly with fork; add liquid slowly; roll or pat out with hands on floured board to about one inch of thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter first dipped in flour. Bake in hot oven twelve or fifteen minutes.


Domestic Science Experts say:


