

TURKEY PRICES SLASHED; GEESE FIND NO BUYERS

Portland, Ore., Nov. 25.—(A.P.) Commission firms along the street began shading prices this morning in order to clean up their turkey stocks. The big rush has practically dried up and supplies are pretty well moved out.

Prices on remaining stocks were down to 44 and 45 cents at noon and expected to go lower during the late trading. Old turkey could be bought at 38 cents and No. 2 birds at 40 cents down.

There was no demand for geese and many of the houses and supplies on hand that could be bought at any price but they were not wanted. Receipts of dressed geese were unusually heavy this year.

Dressed ducks are holding fairly steady at 28 cents for fancy stock. Retail prices are easier with the consumer now paying 47 to 55 cents.

Butter and egg prices are steady and unchanged.

Country dressed veal is scarce and in demand. Choice light calves readily sell at 16 cents. Country dressed hogs about steady at 15 1/2 to 16 cents.

HOP MOVEMENT SLOW IN VALLEY

Some hop business is being transacted, mostly small sales at prices running along 20, 21 and 22 cents a pound. It is estimated there are still about 8000 bales left in the grower, not many of these in large lots. The larger lots include T. H. Jones, 500 bales, probably the largest yet left. Others are Lee Hing, 400 odd bales, Sternberg & Small, Albany, 310 bales, Ed. Hartley, 250 bales, Sloper Brothers, Tidenence, 200 bales, Sid. Beck, 450 bales.

Durbin & Cornoyer are just making their tenth annual shipment of hops to South Africa. This year they are sending 300 bales which go to Capetown, Pretoria, Alga Bay, Salsburg, Johannesburg and Natal. These hop shippers have to be very careful, prepared because of the changes in temperature, as they cross the equator and go back into a temperate zone. The bales are canvassed and this is sized and painted.

TO BUY AND SELL EGGS BY POUND

Buying and selling of eggs by the pound is an innovation which has been established here by W. S. Pitts and will be continued, he asserts, unless the new state law steps in and intervenes. He is not certain what effect the egg law will have on the plan, but expects an inspector soon to pass on the question.

Under the new plan he is paying 34 cents a pound for eggs to farmers and selling them for 38 cents. Under the plan the eggs are not graded. The buyer gets as many ounces or pounds of eggs as he wishes to buy, regardless of their grade and they are sold ungraded. "By this plan," states Pitts, "the buyer gets exactly as many ounces or pounds as he bargains for. They are guaranteed to be fresh eggs but size makes no difference. We believe sale by weight is the only correct way and believe the state law will not interfere."

NEW BOYS SCHOOL AT WOODBURN ACCEPTED

The state board of control yesterday, after making a final inspection of the new state training school near Woodburn, officially accepted the new school. The institution will be fully occupied soon after the first of the year, when a total of about 120 boys will have been transferred. The total cost of the plant was \$305,000, and it consists of seven buildings, a barn and two wells. Fifteen hundred feet of walk remain to be built.

BIG CONSUMERS OF TURKEYS NOT BUYING AT ALL

Lugging camps, state institutions and other large buyers of turkeys in a normal year have balked at the high prices this year, and are not buying, according to local dealers and as a result sale of turkeys have dropped off some from that standpoint. In addition, dealers say that now and then a steady turkey customer of the past has dropped in and declared that prices were too high to put a turkey on the table this year.

However, they say, as a general thing the sale is running along at about a normal clip, being neither unusually large or unusually small.

The birds were still selling along at 48 and 50 cents and many large birds were cut although quite a number of small birds found their way into the markets.

CORN DISPLAYED HERE IS SURPRISE

(Portland Journal)
Corn stalks 13 feet high with huge ears 16 inches long, were exhibited with great surprise. The exhibit was at the Corn show of Marion and Polk counties at Salem last week.

Men from Kansas, men from Illinois and men from the other corn-growing states viewed the exhibit with great surprise. They had not thought that Oregon could grow corn, but freely admitted that what they saw at Salem compared most favorably with corn in the old corn-producing states.

The samples on exhibition were grown in the Liberty district, in the red hills five miles south of Salem. And from the various communities of the two counties, there was not only corn but huge squashes, filberts, walnuts, apples and almost every other product of the soil, all at the point of exhibiting. From the Liberty district a few miles north of Salem, there was exhibited celery as fine even as that grown in the Yakima bay or Troutdale district.

Three hundred carloads of celery from the Liberty district have been shipped East this season.

MEXICANS SEEK AMERICAN HOPS

New hope is held out to Oregon hop dealers.

The chamber of commerce has received a letter from C. M. Cervante, of Nogales, Sonora, S. A., which asks in Mexico, asking for the names of some Oregon hop handlers. Noa Cia Cervante is not a university, a church or a correspondence school. Hophandlers may correspond with it with impunity.

As a matter of fact, as disclosed by the letter itself, a Cia Cervante is nothing more or less than a brewery. Last the younger generation have no knowledge of what a brewery is, it may be said, on inquiry of old timers hereabouts. It was learned that a brewery is a place where beer is made, beer being a beverage once in much demand in these quarters. Custom and inability to get it, have shut off considerably on the use of beer here.

But the Cia Cervante tells the chamber of commerce it is about to set up in the brewing business at Nogales, and if a hop handler wishes to correspond with it for though he might learn something to his advantage.

TURKEYS RETAIL FOR 65 CENTS IN 'FRISCO

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—With turkeys quoted at 65 cents a pound to the housewife, many families today were preparing substitutes for tomorrow's Thanksgiving feast. Jobbers, who paid 48 cents to 53 cents according to age and other quality, asserted that high prices were due to a few birds having been raised this year.

SCALE OF CLASS RATES TO SOUTH TO BE ADVANCED

Portland, Ore., Nov. 25.—A new scale of class rates on commodities moving between California and Oregon points will be put into effect December 23 by the Southern Pacific company unless a suspension order comes from the interstate commerce commission. This announcement was made here today by J. H. Mulhay, assistant traffic manager. Increases in typical instances range from 72 cents to \$2.11 a hundred pounds. Butter, eggs and cheese will be subjected to substantially higher freight charges.

The increase was ordered by the interstate commerce commission without a formal hearing. Portland shipping interests indicated today that protests will be made by Portland, San Francisco and Oakland shipping organizations in the hope that the order will be suspended.

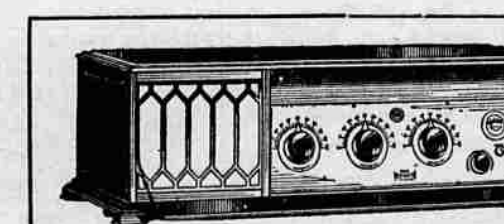
