FOUR DISTRICTS IN POLK COUNTY VOTE ROAD TAXES

Dallas, Or., Nov. 25.—Four Polk county road districts have already voted special levies to apply upon road construction next year and three more districts vote this week. None have voted against special levies to date.

In cases where the taxpayers of a road district voted special levies for road improvement the county court matches the amount raised from the general road fund. Levies voted to date have ranged from 3 mills to the maximum of 10 mills.

Cooper Hollow, district No. 25, voted 10 mills, which will raise \$1300. District 25, in the Redee country, voted 5 mills to raise \$2500. Zena and Lincoln in district 4 voted 4 mills which will raise \$1200. District 12, which lies south and west of the Helmick bridge voted 6.3 mills, to raise \$817.

The three districts yet to vote are 18, lying north of West Salem, which seeks to raise \$2000; district 14, McCoy, \$2500; and district 3, Perrydale, \$2500. The matter will be voted on Friday at McCoy and Perrydale and Saturday in district 18.

WILL OPEN MILL IN WESTERN POLK

Dallas, Or., Nov. 25.—A timber deal aggregating \$165,810 and the immediate erection of a 40,000-foot mill in the New Grand Ronde district was announced in Dallas this week by J. C. Cockerham of Portland.

Mr. Cockerham and David Martiny of Tillamook were the joint owners of the timber which was purchased by J. C. and C. L. Jensen of Kelso and Kostick Bros. of Chehalis, Wash. All are experienced loggers and mill men.

They are shipping a modern mill and planer from Chehalis to be erected on the Alfred Worth place one mile below New Grand Ronde on the South Yamhill river. The timber tract purchased is immediately tributary to the mill site and will be logged at once.

The price received for the timber was \$3 per thousand. It is high quality red fir and it is stated that the owners are able to contract their entire output to Portland concerns if they desire.

The product of the mill will be marketed over the line about a few years ago from the Southern Pacific terminus at Willamina to New Grand Ronde at the time Spaulding and the Miami corporation first became active in that district.

Pacific College, of Newberg met the Angels on College field, and in the second game Mt. Angel swamped the Quakers to the tune of 73 to nothing. COUNTY AGENT PROVIDED FOR IN POLK BUDGET

Dallas, Or., Nov. 25.—Polk county will raise \$251,884 by direct taxation next year if the budget tentatively drawn up by the county budget committee is approved by the taxpayers at a budget meeting called for Monday, December 28, at 10 a. m. This is in addition to municipal, school and special levies and is within the 5 per cent limitation increase.

The budget committee, composed of Clara Irvine, Ira C. Powell, H. Mather Smith and County Judge Hawkins and Commissioners Riddell and Gardner, met Monday. The date for the meeting was set Tuesday.

Provision for the employment of a county extension agent was made in the budget and appropriations were made for the county fair and independence corn show.

The budget committee desired to begin reduction of the county's outstanding warrants and made provision for \$10,000 in the budget for that purpose.

Representatives of a number of county organizations appeared before the committee to present pleas for various appropriations. The hiring of a county nurse, which has been given considerable consideration, was not included in the budget.

The meeting on December 28 will be held in the circuit court room. It had been desired to hold it before Christmas but law does not permit it, owing to the lapse of time required after the first publication of the notice.
