

USE OF SCHOOL GYM BY OUTSIDE TEAMS ALLOWED

The Salem school board at its meeting last night voted to permit the use of the high school gymnasium to outside teams at the rate of 15 per evening, that figure being determined as the amount necessary to meet expenses in keeping the gymnasium open for use. An additional price will be charged in case real games are played in the gymnasium. Last night's action was taken with the understanding that there would be no spectators at the practices, and no smoking by the players.

Christmas vacation was set for Dec. 24 to Jan 3, inclusive. Schools will also be closed Thursday and Friday of this week for Thanksgiving vacation.

An offer made by Nina W. Parrish, granddaughter of J. L. Parrish, for whom the new Salem Junior high school is named, to present a large crayon portrait of her grandfather for display in the building was accepted with thanks by the board.

After a considerable amount of discussion action was taken to install a water heater in the senior high school building to heat water for the shower baths in the evening. Without the special heater it would be necessary to keep a large fire going in the furnace at a much greater expense than that of running the heater. The heater is not to cost more than \$35, and will be installed with the understanding that if not satisfactory it will be removed.

The matter of a new sidewalk near Lincoln school came up for discussion. No definite action was taken on building the walk.
