BULGAR SOLDIER KILLED IN SCRAP ON BORDER

Paris, Nov. 26.—(A. P.)—A Sofia dispatch to La Liberté reports a frontier incident on the Bulgarian-Yugo-Slav border in which two men, believed to be Yugo-Slavs, and one Bulgarian soldier were killed.

The dispatch says a party of four armed men attempted to penetrate Bulgarian territory between the villages of Galabovits and Gourgoulatas, coming from Yugo-Slav territory. Shots were exchanged with a Bulgarian frontier post, two Bulgarian soldiers being wounded in addition to the one killed. The two un wounded assailants retreated to Yugo-Slav soil.
