

# 6 TEAMS SHARE HONORS IN EAST AS SEASON ENDS

New York, Nov. 27.—(A. P.)—Six eleven remained in full possession of the eastern gridiron today after farewell appearances by several major teams in stirring Thanksgiving day struggles.

Tomorrow afternoon, Army and Navy will have their annual classic at the Polo Grounds. The cadets are favorites. Lehigh and Carnegie at Pittsburgh, Pa., and Holy Cross and Boston college at Boston offer the only other big closing games on the eastern front.

Pennsylvania's big chance came when Cornell committed its only blunder. The Ithacans lone fumble of the game rolled the pigskin into the waiting arms of Rogers. Snatching up the ball he raced 45 yards for a touchdown and the Quakers won 7 to 0.

Colgate almost suffered its first defeat at the hands of battered Brown, but Eddie Tryon managed to pull his eleven together for a 14 to 14 tie. In doing so he retained his place at the top of the east individual scorers with a total of 111 points for the season.

Columbia, uncertain throughout the season, yet high in hope as a result of its unexpected triumph over Army, trailed the footsteps of other Columbia teams against Syracuse. In four previous meetings with Syracuse, Columbia had been defeated. Yesterday tackle amashes which wrecked the New York line, gave Syracuse triumph 16 to 5.

Pittsburgh, one of the most powerful teams of the year, came up to expectations in overwhelming Penn State, 23 to 7, while West Virginia likewise retained its high rating by defeating Washington and Jefferson 19 to 0.

Unsets in Middle West. Chicago, Nov. 27.—(A. P.)—The middlewestern football program was ended Thanksgiving day with scores that gave some aspiring eleven little to be thankful for. Nebraska shocked Notre Dame's shock troops in the first period of the game in Lincoln when Rhodes and Handery, Husker backs, went across for touchdowns. Captain Ed Weir, all-American tackle added two points after touchdown and a field goal to put the game on ice. The Rockne men added to a bad start a running attack below

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standard and were able to complete but one in a dozen forward pass attempts. The Notre Dame debacle was viewed by 45,000 homecoming spectators, the largest crowd that ever saw a game in the Missouri valley conference.

In Missouri valley conference games Kansas Aggies downed Iowa State 12 to 7; Washington beat Grinnell by the margin of a field goal and Oklahoma overwhelmed Oklahoma A. and M. 55 to 0.

Intersectional invaders fared badly. St. Louis took advantage

of a blocked punt and successful line plunges to beat Vermont 7 to 0, and Marquette sent Mercer back to Dixie on the short end of 30 to 0.

### GIRL AND TWO MEN IN BOMBING FIGHT CAUGHT

Chicago, Nov. 27.—(A. P.)—Two men and a girl were captured and another man was thought to

have been killed when scores of policemen ambushed a gang just as they exploded a bomb which wrecked a hardware store.

Miss Lee McClellan of Columbus, Ohio, Fred Walmquist and Joseph Aveni were arrested. The men were shot about the head, in the chase that followed the explosion. The supposed dead man was believed thrown from the bombers automobile before it was overtaken by pursuing detective squads.

## TWO KILLED IN POLICE BATTLE WITH BANDITS

Chicago, Nov. 27.—(A. P.)—Two men, one a policeman, were killed and two others, including a policeman, were wounded in a south side tobacco shop early today in a shooting affray in which one of four assailants was described by the wounded policeman as Mary Durkin, fugitive police slayer.

The policeman had been spending the last five nights in the shop. Shortly after midnight while they were talking to five loungers in the shop the quartet entered and the shooting began. It was thought the policeman had been assigned to the shop on a tip that Durkin might visit there.

James Carroll, policeman, and Ben Ouster, a taxi-driver, were killed; James Henry, the other policeman, probably fatally wounded, and Gus Soeldner, a loungeer, slightly injured, Henry said Durkin was one of the men.

The shop is located in an area known as the habitat of rangers and is not far from the flat where Durkin escaped a police trap after killing a detective sergeant, nearly a month ago.

Detective Chief Shoemaker, after questioning witnesses who saw the killers escape, said he doubted that Durkin led them. He admitted the policeman had been sent to the shop to anticipate Durkin.

George Steward, porter in the shop said the shooting began when three men entered and or-

dered all inside to raise their hands. Carroll emptied his pistol at them before he was mortally wounded and Custer was shot as he started to run. Henry attempted to stop them at the door as they left.

Chief Shoemaker said his men had been ordered to remain outside the shop and had disobeyed him in entering the place.

### FIRST THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION IN 1777

York, Pa., Nov. 27.—(A. P.)—Although the first observance of Thanksgiving day in America is credited to the Pilgrims in 1621, York today claims the honor of being the birthplace of the first national Thanksgiving proclamation. The proclamation, issued in 1777, was a product of the meeting of the Continental congress in New York from September 30, 1777, to June 27, 1778.

Shortly after the congress assembled here, news of the surrender of General Burgoyne reached the members. On October 31, President Laurence appointed Richard Henry Lee of Virginia, Samuel Adams of Massachusetts and General Robert M. of Pennsylvania a committee to draft a national proclamation of Thanksgiving. The document was written by Lee and on November 1,

the committee brought in a report which was adopted. The word "friend" is probably the most abused one in the language.

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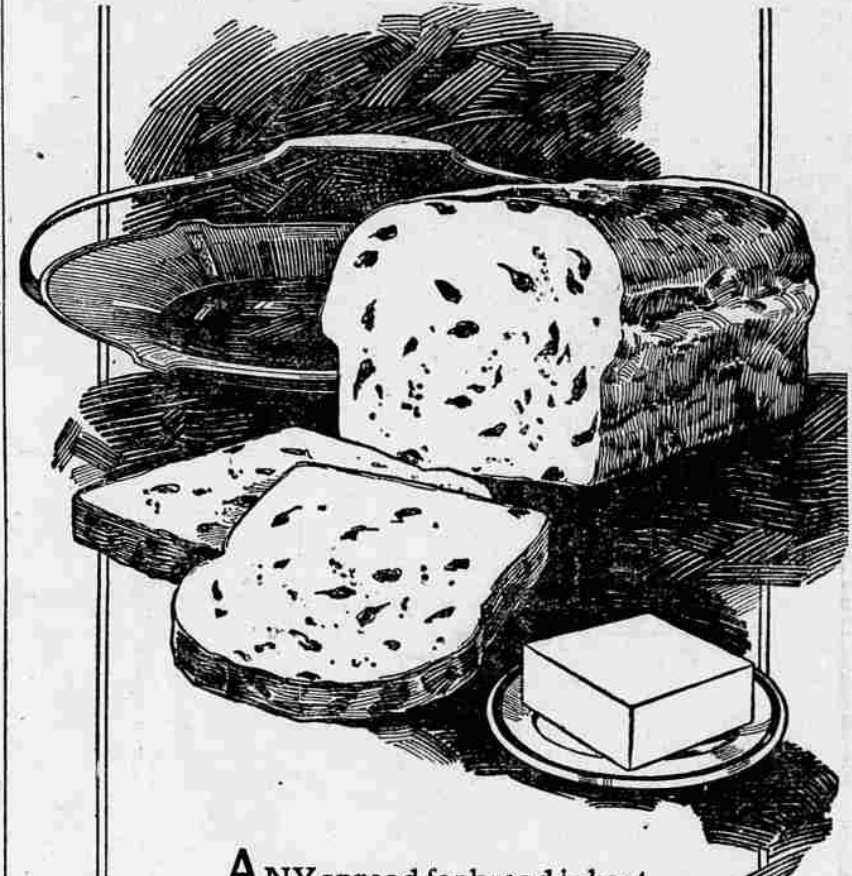
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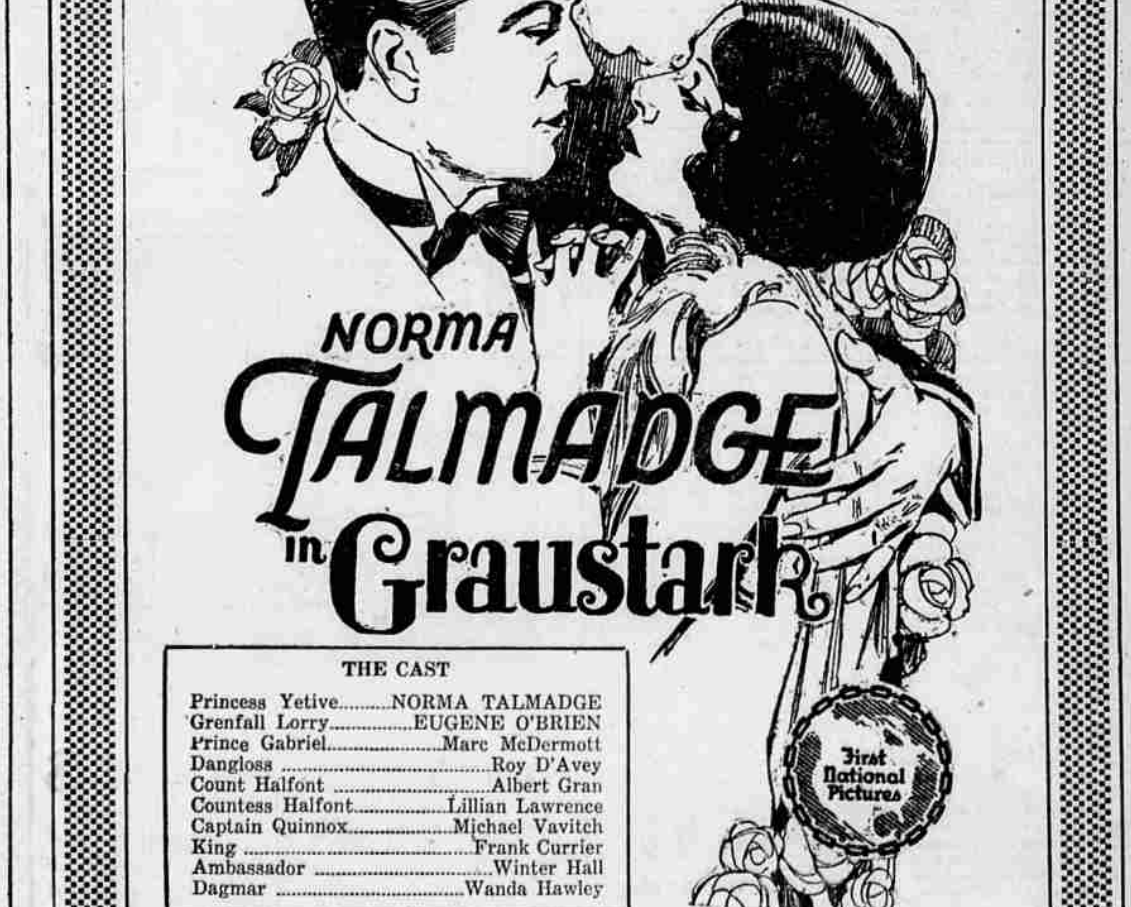
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
