BOVARD DENIES COACH SELECTED

Eugene, Ore., Nov. 28.—Denial that a football coach for next year has been signed for the University of Oregon was made here Friday by John F. Bovard, dean of the school of physical education and Dr. H. C. Howe, of the English department. Dr. Howe is a member of the athletic committee of the university.

"None" Price, mentioned in a dispatch from Walla Walla, as the probable new mentor, is being considered, among others, they said. A new coach is to be selected, they declared, but the matter has not been definitely settled.

Both men expressed the opinion that the announcement of Virgil Earl, athletic director of the university, in Seattle yesterday, was premature.
