

POTATOES DULL  
BELOW LOWERS  
AS CREAM DROPS

Portland, Ore., Nov. 30.—(A.P.)—Local potato buyers and jobbers who were extremely bullish a few weeks ago, now admit that the anticipated 45 price is very remote. Not only is the local situation quiet but both primary markets in the northwest as well as large consuming markets throughout the country are showing a very stagnant tone.

At Yakima the market is reported steady at 1.45 to 1.70 a ton for U. S. No. 1 Netted Gems branded and 1.40 to 1.62 for plain bags. Combination stock is down to 1.15 a ton. It moved in the Yakima valley over the week end and there was practically no hauling or inquiry sales were very light.

Around Portland buyers are paying \$2.50 to \$2.60 for 17-18 No. 1 Burbanks and furnishing bags at county points.

In the city the wholesale price ranges all the way from \$3.00 to \$3.75 per hundred.

Print butter is 2 cents lower today at 45 cents a pound creamery brand. Cartons are 15 cents. At the same time local buttermilk reduced their cream bids, now paying 52 cents a pound f. o. b. shippers track in zone one. Competition for cream receipts is not so keen now and bids are more uniform than they have been for some time past.

Country dressed meat arrivals were light on the street this morning but there was a good call for fancy veal now selling at 14 to 16 1/2 cents. Ordinary hogs and calves are selling at 15 1/2 cents.
