

PETZEL APPEALS FROM BOUNDARY BOARD DECISION

C. A. Petzel of Buena Crest school district beyond the Keizer school house, is taking an appeal from the district boundary board's decision, refusing to change the boundary lines between the Buena Crest and Clear Lake districts. Appeal is to the state superintendent of public instruction. The district boundary board, from which the appeal is taken, is made up of members of the county court and the county superintendent.

Petzel wanted the district boundaries so his children could go to the Clear Lake school, rather than to the Buena Crest school, claiming the Clear Lake school was nearer. In addition, Petzel told the boundary board, there was a good gravel road to the Buena Crest school and traveling on the gravel road wore out the children's shoes.

The boundary board, in denying Petzel petition, had a measurement taken showing that there was less than a half mile's difference in the distances. In addition it was shown that the valuation of the Clear Lake district is at present much greater than that of Buena Crest and if the change desired by Petzel were made it would still give Buena Crest a smaller valuation and enhance that of Clear Lake. A remonstrance also was filed from Buena Crest signed by 18 people.

Moral Conditions At Prison Disgusting Says Ex-Convict

ed upon by the most despicable of all men, the moral, or sex pervert. In the prison club house, where prisoners assemble and spend their idle hours, one section was until quite recently partitioned off from the rest and access was gained from the outside only. It could not have been more conveniently arranged for the purposes of these pervers and here this practice was carried on, as nauseating and heinous in character as anything depicted in the Old Testament scriptures of the days of Sodom and Gomorrah. So generally known was this infamous practice in the prison yard that Guard John Davidson used it to justify his mania for firing upon convicts in the yard. Not until then were those partitions removed.

Nothing Done by Officers.
It will not do for Warden Dalrymple to plead ignorance of these conditions. It was known with disgust by guards and prisoners alike, and there was no apparent effort on the part of the prison officials to suppress this most degrading of moral filth. I have personally known of trustees thrown into the yard by guards for conduct which in the outside world would be classed as criminal, being sustained in their actions by those in authority and assigned to departments outside the walls almost immediately after being returned to the yard.

For the benefit of the visiting public there is a large sign posted in the chapel lobby which reads: "No profanity or swearing tolerated. Orders of the warden."

No one has ignored this order, with such apparent deliberation as the prison officials themselves.

Drinking Is Allowed.
Drinking by officials and guards

while on duty has been considered an innocent pastime, and some have been let out on this account. Painters' shellee and other high voltage alcoholic concoctions used about the prison were not spared by the thirty in emergencies. The alcoholic conduct of some of the guards has at times been the source of much entertainment for the prisoners.

Perhaps there is no other institution in modern society where the surrounding influences and conditions call for stricter discipline than in a penitentiary. There we have a variety of men, from the hard-boiled and aggressive criminal to the imbecile. I do not wish to be understood as saying that all convicts are innately vicious or depraved. Quite the contrary. I find the majority of prisoners in the Oregon penitentiary to compare quite favorably in the matter of their conduct among themselves with men in other groups of society. Some are highly intelligent, and others are hopelessly wanting in that respect. Scores of them are incarcerated for infractions of technical laws who have never committed a moral offense.

It is the small minority, the hard-boiled professionals in crookedness and the pervers who, under some discipline, take advantage of conditions existing to the expense and anguish of others.

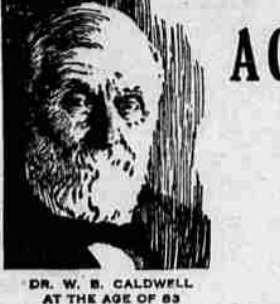
