

NOVEMBER RAIN HEAVIEST SINCE LAST FEBRUARY

With 5.24 inches of moisture falling during the month, November of this year was the wettest month since February, according to weather statistics made public this morning by Clarence Oliver, government weather observer for Salem. One 24 hour period of the month, ending on the evening of Nov. 11 was the wettest day of the year. One and twenty two hundredths of an inch of rain fell during that time. There has been only two other days this year when more than an inch of rain fell, one day being Jan. 29, with 1.04 inches, and the other February 8, with 1.14 inches.

The lowest temperature of the month reached early on the morning of Nov. 23, was 23 degrees above zero, and was the lowest since Jan. 15, when the mercury dropped to the same point.

The level of the Willamette river, at 2.5 feet below normal at the beginning of the month, the lowest point to which it fell during the entire year, began to rise on Nov. 3, rising steadily throughout most of the month. The highest point of the month, 1.8 feet above normal, was reached on the evening of Nov. 13.

Last night registered the highest minimum of the month, with the temperature falling only to 53 degrees. Although it was actually part of the month of Nov., it will be computed in the statistics for Dec., the record not being taken until this morning.

The total rainfall at Salem for the first 11 months of the year stands at 29.51 inches, or 2.33 less than the official normal precipitation for last period. To reach the normal rainfall by the end of this year it will be necessary for 8.22 inches of rain to fall in December. Normal rainfall for Salem is 37.73 inches annually. If more than 3.64 inches of moisture falls during the last month of this year the year 1925 will be wetter than the year 1924, which was unusually dry year.

Distraction Widespread

Trees, shrubbery, electric light and telephone wires were down in the residential section of Tampa, while downtown, signs, smokestacks and wooden awnings were blown down. The utilities companies here issued warnings that the streets are not safe due to fallen power lines.

Railroads are without fires, officials report, and trains to this city are delayed.

Reports from West Palm Beach said:

"The entire Florida east coast was whipped by a strong northeasterly gale. A stretch of ocean boulevard near the inlet to Lake Worth, nine miles north of West Palm Beach, was being undermined by the waves and volunteers rushed to the scene with logs, tree stumps and stakes to try to save the road."

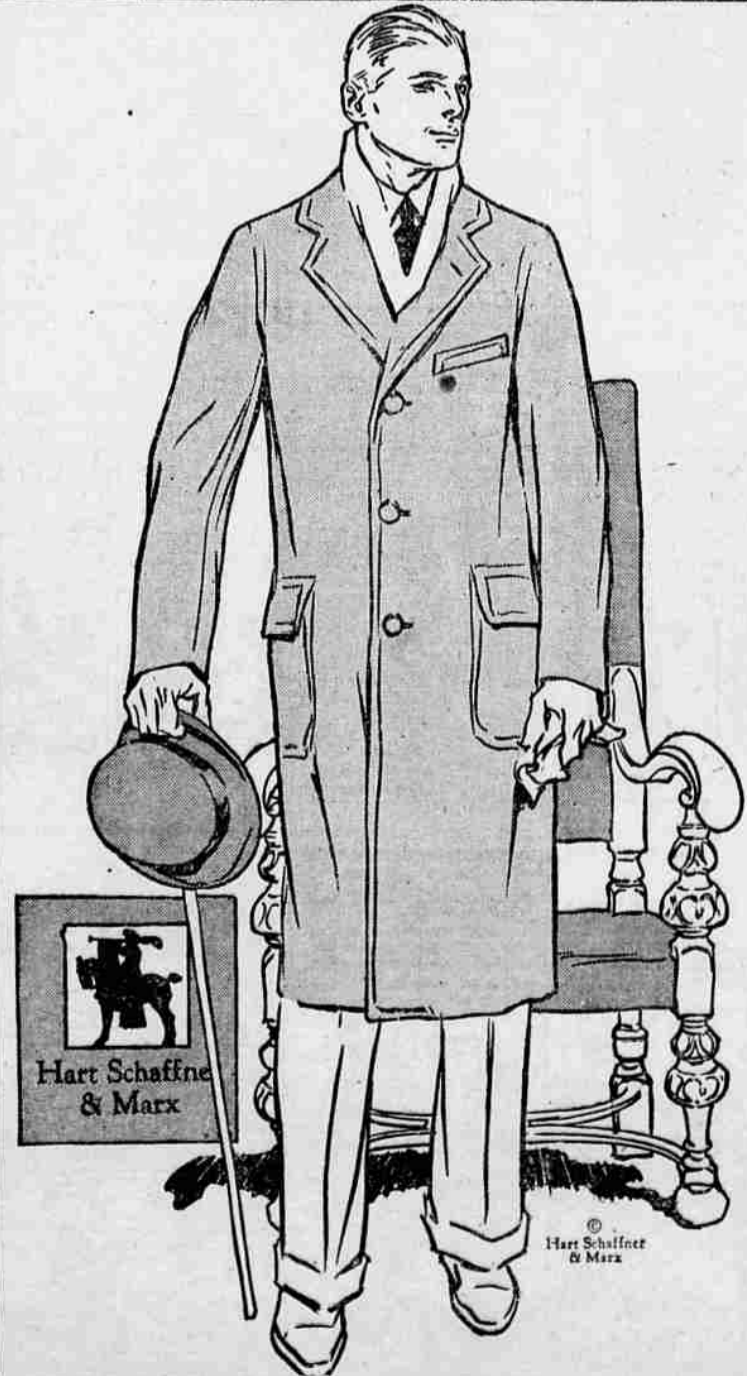
