

STATE BOARD TO MAKE STUDY OF REFORESTATION

Following a meeting of the state board of forestry here yesterday afternoon, it was decided that the board will undertake a study of reforestation in this state. Dean George W. Peavy, George L. Gerlinger and C. M. Granger taking a lead in the study.

"This committee will collect data," said State Forester P. A. Elliott yesterday, "relative to costs and methods of reforestation and outline some definite approved policy which can be adopted by the board."

"Another question discussed by the board was the problem of slash disposal in the Port Orford cedar region near Marshfield. When only the cedar is cut, as is often the case there, it is impossible of the slash by broadcast burning without destroying other merchantable species on the ground. With disposal of the slash arising from the operations, there remains on the ground a distinct fire menace. So that the board may investigate conditions there and get first hand information a trip will be made to Marshfield and vicinity December 18 and 19. It is expected a number of cedar operators will accompany the board members.

ATHENS POLICE PUT BAN ON SHORT SKIRTS

London, Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—The police of Athens have issued a special regulation which forbids Greek girls over 12 years of age and Greek women to wear skirts more than 12 inches off the ground, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from the Greek capital. Transgression of the regulation will be prosecuted. The new measure becomes effective December 15.

Medford Making Big Plans For Salem Hi Game; Expect to Win

Reports from Medford anticipate one of the hardest fought games of the season when the Salem high school eleven meets Medford in a post-season game at Medford next Saturday. Medford won the Southern Oregon championship and is hoping to take this win from Salem. Tickets have been placed on sale for the game and they are moving fast. It is said, some of them declaring the game will draw from 7500 to 8000 people.

Large delegations from the near by Southern Oregon towns have written for tickets. Delegations from Ashland, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls are expected. Newspapers from Sacramento and San Francisco have wired for press tickets.

The Medford team, said to be the most powerful had by the school for some time, has been working hard in preparation for the game, developing speed with lumbering up exercises and fast signal drills. The Medford team is not as heavy as that of the red and black but is said to be the fastest and shiftest. They are hoping to beat Salem with trick plays and forward passes. With a heavy line, however, the Medford team will find hard plugging and will have a hard time in winning from the locals.

Medford team has been going through light signal drills and has dropped all scrimmages for the rest of the week. The Salem and Medford eleven met once before with the locals getting the best of it 14 to 13. Medford is expecting to get revenge.

Hollis Huntington, coach of the Salem team is working his team hard and has announced that there will be some practice tonight, the last scrimmage for the team this year. No scrimmage was held last night but the players were put through a long and fast signal practice. Kicking practice was also held, with Temple doing the punting.

John Drager's condition has improved so much during the last week that he is expected to get into the game for at least a short time. Drager said last night that his knees were improving and if he continued to do so well in the next two or three days that he would be in the lineup. GIRLS ARE HELD SLAVES, REPORT

Manila, P. I., Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—Girls are reported being held in servitude for a period of from one to seven years in Occidental negroes province under circumstances amounting to slavery. This was the condition revealed by reports made by consular officials who say they have uncovered a series of illegal detention cases. The information says that at a plantation near the town of Isabella, a number of girls have been held in compulsory service without payment.

At a designated plantation the consular report says the girls suffered from habitual cruel treatment at the hands of their mistresses. When angered the woman in charge compelled the girls to work for 48 hours without food and some times whipped them. Elaborating, the reports say a mistress once threw a pot of boiling water over a girl who died within two weeks from the burns.

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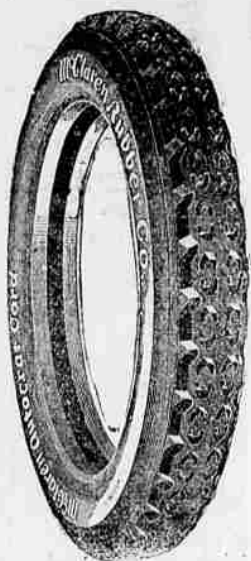
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DEAF HUSBAND SWORE AT HER ON FINGERS

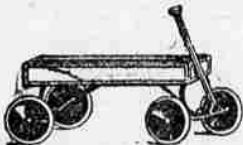
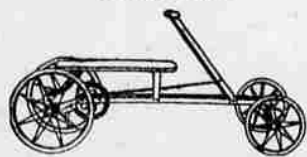
