500 CONVICTS AT PEN SEE "SUN UP"

Nearly five hundred inmates of the Oregon state penitentiary witnessed the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production of "Sun-Up" last night, which is playing at the Heilig theater today and tomorrow. The film was taken to the penitentiary through the courtesy of Archie Holt, resident manager of the theatre.

The convicts filed through the doors into the chapel to the music of the prison orchestra. Little ones, large ones, tall ones, skinny ones and fat ones were equally pleased with the showing as they proved by roars of laughter.

The play deals with the ignorance and equality of Georgia, with their feuds and continual bickering. Conrad Nagel and Pauline Stark, star in the play, written by Lulu Valmer. It is a gripping mountain picture. A tale of passionate love, unending feud and amazing sacrifice. Harold Windus, new concert organist of the Heilig theatre accompanied the picture. Mr. Holt is planning on taking other pictures to the prison.

MRS. JACKSON SAYS ICELAND FREE OF CRIME

parts of the country are a "very artistic people," the unique wrestling bouts staged by the Icelanders, the public laundry plants made from the hot springs that bubble from the ground in numerous spots on the island, and the "beautiful horses, fed not on hay or grain, but on fish."

Iceland is only 12 days' travel from Portland, Ore. Mrs. Jackson said, but the steamer making the trip from New York travels over the route once each year. The winter nights there are extremely long, and in summer there are practically no nights, but only two hours of twilight out of the 24. The twilight comes between midnight and 2 a. m. The island has a population of 100,000. Measures about half the size of Oregon, and "only about a fifth of the land they have is fit for use," the remainder being volcanic.

There is not a single illiterate person, a pauper or a lunatic in the entire island, Mrs. Jackson declared. Fishing is the greatest industry, but they produce a large quantity of woolen products shipping much of it to the United States, including Indian blankets "just like ours here in Oregon."

The speaker mentioned briefly other points of interest seen on her trip after leaving Iceland. Among other things she spoke of the midnight sun "that started to set, heautated, and then shot up again," chickens that went to roost at 11 o'clock in the morning, Jewish vanity cases, bracelets and a 16-inch statue of Abraham, all over 6000 years old, shown in the British museum; and 12,000,000 bottles of champagne in France prepared for shipment to the United States for "medical purposes."

Mrs. Jackson had with her a whip used by horseback riders in Iceland, a cured sheepskin produced there, an old piece of wooden pottery and a piece of peat used for cooking. "All their wood is drifted in from Iceland, and they use hot water from the springs to heat their houses," she said.

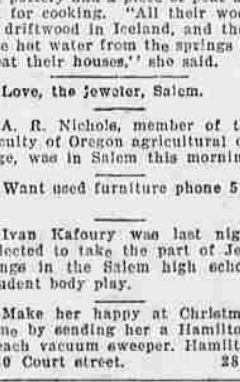

When Santa entered the dining room at the Marion this noon where the Rotarians were having lunch they all sang "Jingle Bells" for him and clinked spoons on their glasses so it sounded like real sleigh bells. Santa told the Rotarians that the Willamette valley is one of the most beautiful places in the world and that he is enjoying being in Salem and seeing the beautiful capital by day so much more than he does his short visit on Christmas eve when he rides over the house tops. He said he felt repaid a hundred times in making the extra sacrifices that he had to make in leaving his important work such a short time before Christmas in order to come down here.

One thing Santa said he liked very well is a cherry pie. He told the Rotarians all about the good cherry pies his mother used to make for him and said he was sure the cherries came from Salem. He even suggested that he thought it would be nice to have Christmas in July when the cherries are ripe so when he came to Salem he could stop in a cherry orchard for a short time before going on to fill the thousands and thousands of stockings hung before fireplaces in all parts of the world.

Even the little children out at the deaf school came in this afternoon to see old Santa. The bigger ones rode in on the street car and some of the Rotarians took their cars out to get the tiny tots. From two thirty to four thirty Santa talked to hundreds of the little folks and when he goes back tonight he is taking with him the letters that they wrote so he can look them over before Christmas eve.

Sanitation Held Bad. The sanitary conditions in the bull-pen and dungeon are deplorable. Open pails are substituted for lavatories, and the pails are only emptied when the weather is such as to allow the prisoners confined there to get into the yard for exercise. The stench from these poor helpless victims when released was almost intolerable.

Prison officials have been careful not to let these conditions become generally known. During the Kelley and Murray trials, in advance of a supposed surprise visit by the jury, twelve convicts then in the bull pen and dungeon were herded into the auditorium and placed under heavy guard while the bull pen and dungeon were scrubbed and cleaned up.

Find Skeleton Of Legendary Goddess Buried In Sahara

type. It is thought possible that the expedition has found the body of the ancient heroine who is the root and whole structure of Tuareg mythology.

The weapons usually buried with persons of high rank were not found. Garments of a dignitary were found piled in an anteroom of the burial chamber. Beads, carved plectrums and objects of gold and silver were dug up in the mound covering the skeleton. The beads which were similar to those of the third and fourth centuries found in the temple of Taut at Carthage, gave the first clue to the date of the tomb.

Massive bracelets on the arms of the skeleton were believed to be of gold and silver alloyed with another metal, probably antimony, which was used by the Carthagians to give gold and silver jewelry additional weight and hardness.

Convicts Are Exploited By Fellows For Clothing Etc., At Prison

I have known cases where convicts have stolen chickens from the residences of guards and traded them in at the prison store for clothing. Loose discipline in chief responsible for the existence of such conduct as this, for the prisoners, always hungry and generally ragged are not usually above stealing if necessary to better their lot.

Convicts employed in and about the dining rooms are permitted to barter away portions of their regular meals to other convicts for weed. In the laundry the convicts in charge are permitted to steal the clothes of other prisoners and sell them for tobacco, notwithstanding that the attention of the yard captain and other guards has been called to this practice. Only one prisoner—Mexican—was punished for stealing to my knowledge during the 10 months I spent there. I know of cases, however, where trunks were turned back into the yards by guards for this offense, only to be defended by Warden Dalrymple and immediately re-assigned to other departments outside the walls.

"Shakedown" In France. Every one of the convicts are subjected to what is termed the "shakedown." This search for forbidden articles was supposed to be a surprise attack where convicts
