PRISON GUNS NOW IN TOWER

Rifles, revolvers and shotguns which ever since the construction of the state penitentiary in 1871 have been kept in an arsenal in the center of the main prison building, now known as the turnkey's office, will today be moved to a new brick tower that stands half inside and half outside the front spiked fence of the prison premises.

This is according to one of the recommendations made by a special investigating committee following the break of Tom Murray, Oregon Jones, James Wilcox and Ellsworth Kelley on August 12 last, in which two guards, John Sweney and J. M. Holman, and the convict Jones lost their lives.

The new tower occupies a commanding position where guns of the guards cover the entire front grounds of the prison.

ALICE JONES' FATHER CAUSES ROW IN COURT

White Plains, N. Y., Dec. 3.—(A. He finally was prevailed upon to sit down and court was recessed for 15 minutes.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Winter laid a heavy covering over the Rocky mountains today with promise of the storm continuing tonight. The snowfall extended from Montana to New Mexico, in the southern portion of the inter-mountain area the storm raged with greater intensity. In southern Wyoming and northern Colorado the storm attained almost blizzard like proportions.

REPUBLICANS BALKING AT BID TO LA FOLLETTE

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Failure so far of a number of their party colleagues to fall in line with the plan of senate republican leaders to recognize without issue the republicanism of Senator-elect LaFollette, of Wisconsin, is threatening to produce some troubled waters for the party conference next Saturday.

Senator Butler of Massachusetts, chairman of the republican national committee, is one of those apparently still on the fence on the question of treating the Wisconsin senator as a party regular in committee assignments and other matters. He has declined to commit himself, however, further than to say that the matter is still one for "consultation."

Leaders who are endeavoring to submerge the issue include Senator Curtis of Kansas, the majority floor leader, Senator Moses of New Hampshire president pro tempore of the senate, and Senator Jones of Washington, the republican "whip."

With some senators insisting, however, that Mr. LaFollette's speeches in his recent campaign constituted attacks on the president and the republican party, Senator Watson of Indiana, vice chairman of the conference is still studying his campaign utterances.

OREGON WANTS DOBIE TO COACH

Ithaca, N. Y., Dec. 3.—(A. P.)—Glenn Dobie has no intention as retiring as coach of the Cornell football team. He so announced last night when questioned as to a report that he had been approached to become head coach at the University of Oregon.

"As far as I know I am going to continue here until the expiration of my contract, seven years hence," was Dobie's comment.

Eugene, Or., Dec. 3.—University of Oregon athletic officials here made no comment today on reports from Ithaca, N. Y., to the effect that he had been asked to coach the university football teams here.

The officials in Eugene stood by their statement that no announcement would be made until December 10, relative to selection of a new coach.

are going to be no more warnings. Drivers who will not dim their lights are going to be arrested every night."

Enforce Speed Limit Law

The next step in the police campaign to reduce wet weather accidents will be stricter enforcement of the speed limits on wet pavements. In this regard the motorists are going to be held strictly to the 20 mile limit when the streets are wet.

Plans are also being formulated by the police department to establish brake testing stations at two or three points in the city, and here motorists will be given the opportunity of voluntarily testing out their brakes. The stations will also be used by the traffic officers to test brakes they suspect of being defective.

Figures compiled of the traffic accidents in Salem this year have already amounted to nearly 1900, and by the first of January will have exceeded that mark," said Chief Miller. "More than half of these can be classified as avoidable, and if it is possible we are going to cut this figure in half by compelling careful driving and attention to brakes."

reform organizations, expressed the sentiments of the gathering and his speech was made public as containing the views of the committee.

Every effort of dry organizations to respond to the appeal of President Coolidge and prohibition officials for aid in enforcement, he said, had been defeated by "unfit and unfavorable appointments by those making the appeals."

"There sits a man in the White House of silent determination," he said.

Criticism Coolidge

"The president has done some fine moralizing on the general enforcement of the law, but he never yet has definitely committed his administration to the enforcement of the 18th amendment, as provided by his oath of office to support the constitution."

"He knows how to speak on the world court. He has spoken bold and ringing words on the question of the world peace and in his address at Omaha to the American Legion he said 'this country has had all the war, all the taxation and all the militarism it wants,' but a national scandal unequalled in its financial and political ramifications in the history of the United States has brought this country nearer to the brink of destruction than it has been at any period since the Civil war."

Mr. Howard charged the law has not been enforced beyond the point where, in the opinion of the enforcers, it would hurt the party in power. As an example of the free flow of liquor, he said, 30,000 arrests had been made in Washington for drunkenness since prohibition became a law.

He declared the wet leaders were out to capture both the major political conventions.
