## Mrs. Byrd Passes 90th Birthday

Mrs. Martha Byrd, one of Salem's oldest and best beloved pioneers, is celebrating her ninetieth birthday anniversary today. Her children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, brothers, sisters, nieces, nephews and scores of old friends are honoring her today at an informal "at home" at the home of Judge and Mrs. L. H. McMahon, on north Front street, her son in law and daughter with whom she makes her home.

This evening Dr. and Mrs. Prince Byrd will entertain at a family dinner in their home honoring Mrs. Byrd. An informal reception will be held again this evening in the McMahon home to which all old friends of Mrs. Byrd will be welcomed.

Since the early fifties Mrs. Byrd has been a resident of Salem. She was born in Missouri on December 3, 1835, and was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. John Savage, who brought their family across the plains to Oregon in 1850. For many years Dr. Savage was a prominent physician and farmer in this district. In 1854 nineteen year old Martha Savage married Lorenzo A. Byrd, a young man who had come to Salem from Arkansas.

The eight children born of this union, all of whom are still living, are Dr. W. H. Byrd of Salem, J. C. Byrd of Spokane, E. F. Byrd of Spokane, Dr. Roy Byrd of Salem, L. A. Byrd of Salem, Mrs. Cordelia Hager of Salem, Mrs. L. H. McMahon of Salem and Miss Virginia Byrd of Portland.

For nearly seventy five years Mrs. Byrd has been prominently connected with history making in Salem and Marion county. She has seen Salem grow from a tiny village to a small city of more than twenty thousand inhabitants. No pioneer can tell more interesting tales of the county's development than Mrs. Byrd who remembers events of sixty, seventy five and more years ago as clearly as though they happened yesterday.

The necessity of maintaining "idealism," and the capacity for appreciation of the finer things in life, and a plea for true womanliness, were voiced before a group of Salem business and professional women last night, by Rev. Martin Fereshethian, the speaker of the evening. Mr. Fereshethian chose for his topic "Idealism in Business and Professions." He traced the development of woman's importance in the business world, he outlined the qualities and attributes which woman brings into the gross materialism of the business world and his warning was to retain these qualities and not to ape men.

Music for the evening was furnished by the orthophonic Victrola for the occasion by Moore's music house. A chicken dinner was served at six thirty with the program following. During the business meeting the business women took definite action in support of the Marion county health demonstration work. Mrs. W. A. Jones is spending several days in Portland. She is the house guest of Mrs. L. E. Caviness of Portland.

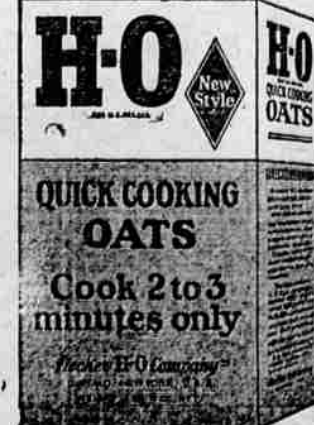
