

STATE HI SCHOOL LEADERS SWARM TO EUGENE MEET

University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 4.—(Special)—Leaders of 25,000 high school students of the state are here for the initial session of the sixth annual high school conference, which opened this morning at 9 o'clock.

From east and west, north and south, over highway and railway, delegates last night and this morning poured into the campus for the two-day sessions at which they will thresh out problems of high school life. Approximately 500 are here.

The wheels started rolling with the opening of the first joint session. Walter Malcolm, president of the student body, addressed the delegates on "Conference Objectives." Dr. H. E. Sheldon, chairman of the administrative committee, gave the address of welcome.

The conference was then divided into three groups, the association of Student Body officers, the High School Press Association and the Association of Girls' Leagues. The faculty division held no session on Friday, but convenes Saturday from 10 to 12 o'clock.

Avery Thompson, Salem High school president of the student officers division presided at the sessions of that group which were held in the Music auditorium. C. A. Howard, superintendent of the Marshfield public schools and Dean Marion Brown, University high school, Oakland, California, were the principal speakers of this session. Superintendent Howard talked on "Socializing Values in High School Athletics." A discussion by delegates followed the two addresses.

CREATE BUREAU FOR PROMOTION OF CIVIL AVIATION

Washington, Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—Legislation already in preparation to give effect to the proposal for the creation of a bureau of civil aeronautics in the department of commerce to promote commercial aviation, along with its recommended expansion of civil and military aviation.

Senator Bingham, a member of the board who joined in the unanimous report of its nine members, said today he would introduce a bill giving the government wider latitude in adding civil aviation than and legislation yet proposed. A companion bill will be introduced in the house by Chairman Parker of the commerce committee.

At this time, however, it has not contemplated to include in the aviation provision for an additional assistant secretary in the department to head the bureau, as recommended by the board along with its proposal for another assistant secretary also in both the war and navy departments to vote themselves primarily to aviation.

Creation of these new offices in the three departments formed the central recommendation of the board in its program for progressive development of both military and civil aviation in the United States.

COURT MARTIAL FOR THREE NAVAL OFFICERS

Washington, Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—Three naval officers were ordered tried by court martial today as a result of the collision last September of the light cruiser Milwaukee and the American schooner Benjamin A. Van Brunt off Hampton Roads.

Those to be brought before the court are Captain Frank L. Pinney of South Manchester, Conn., commanding the Milwaukee; Lieutenant (junior grade) Thomas A. Corey of Little Rock, Ark., officer of the deck of the light cruiser

OCEAN LINER LIQUOR RING IN FEDERAL TOILS

New York, Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—Twenty men were arrested today as the leaders of an alleged liquor ring which United States District Attorney Buckner said controlled 18 ocean steamers engaged in bringing liquor from foreign ports to rum row.

The roundup was described by federal authorities as the greatest raid on rum importing and distributing forces that has yet been made in the United States.

One of the prisoners was "Bill" Dwyer, who Mr. Buckner said he had been informed, was half owner of the Mount Royal race track in Montreal and also of the Coney Island race track in Cincinnati. Dwyer is alleged by the government agents to be the head of the alleged ring.

Major Walter A. Green, representing General Lincoln C. Andrews of the treasury department, figured in the roundup.

One of the steamers owned by the ring was the Augusta, which was captured last July with 4038 cases of liquor aboard. Federal authorities said the ring maintained a suite of offices in the East River Savings bank building and had headquarters in Lexington avenue.

CHICKS CROSSED WITH TURKEYS

Des Moines, Iowa, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The latest style in barnyard fowls, the "turken," produced by the union of a turkey gobbler and a chicken, will be shown at the poultry show here next week when ten specimens will be exhibited.

Roy Beck, real estate promoter and breeder of the new poultry hybrid, believes that next November it will be the turken's turn to crow—at 70 to 80 cents a pound. The turken's meat is said to be predominantly turkey in flavor, but of more delicate and finer texture.

Santa Cruz, Cal., Dec. 4.—Turkens have been produced here for five years by E. T. Spencer and sold in poultry markets. Spencer said today when shown the dispatch from Des Moines reporting production of hybrid poultry.

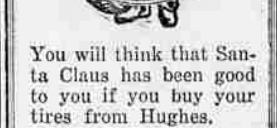
