PEAVY OPPOSES RETURN OF FOREST LANDS TO STATE

Opposition to the idea of turning over the federal forest reserve in Oregon to the state, proposed by Senator Stanford in a recent speech at the Salem chamber of commerce, and defense of the present system under which the reserve is operated, was voiced by Dean George W. Peavy of Oregon Agricultural college in a speech before the Salem Lions club here this noon. "I believe that such a plan would be a great mistake," said Dean Peavy. He did not mention Stanford by name.

There are 35,000,000 acres of federal reserve in Oregon at the present time. Peavy stated. Money derived from the sale of parts of the reserve, and from grazing fees and other sources of revenue, is distributed 35 per cent among the counties having forest reserves in Oregon, the counties' revenue being proportional to the amount of reserve growing in their boundaries. The remaining 65 per cent is used by the federal government to carry on the forest service, which Peavy declared is necessary and an efficient service as operated at present. Under present conditions part of the government's 65 per cent left over after paying expenses of the services would go into the federal treasury.

Peavy advocated the creation of a state forestry program which would involve taking over cut over land from private owners and allowing it to grow again into timber. He also advocated a reduction of taxes on cut over land to such an extent that it would become possible for them to allow their land to grow up into new forests.

"Within a few years the Pacific northwest is due for the greatest era of prosperity in its history," according to Dean Peavy, due to the influx of timber men who have exhausted their resources in other parts of the United States.

"I need only cite the growth of the city of Los Angeles," he said, "as the answer to the question, 'Is the south going out of the timber game?'"

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Good Financial Showing. The report also says: "The Klamath project has made a fine financial showing in the matter of its debt to the United States. Eighty-eight per cent of operation and maintenance and nearly 99 per cent of accrued construction assessments have been paid. However, this condition was largely brought about by a credit to the district of \$30,000, an account of an adjustment of the matter of carrying water to the Van Brimmer ditch and the yearly additions made to the assessment rolls amounting to 10 per cent, to cover probable delinquencies. The fact is that a considerable number of water users are delinquent to the district for their irrigation taxes. Four large holdings, comprising 1470 acres are delinquent in their state, county and irrigation taxes, including penalties for a total of \$28,884. If this sum and other delinquencies of lesser amounts were collected and the portion of these representing irrigation taxes turned over to the district it would be in a very easy condition. The entering of the district's tax lists in such cases will accomplish this result."
