MAJORITY OF METHODISTS AT OLD WILLAMETTE

Church preferences of Willamette university students during the period of the past nine years represent a total of 22 denominations, with a consistent majority of Methodists, according to statistics compiled by the sociology department of the university, headed by Dr. D. B. Laughlin. The report has been in process of formation since the beginning of the present school year, which ends next spring.

The smallest percentage in any one year of freshmen who were Methodists was in 1924-25, when a percentage of 58.8 were enrolled. The Presbyterian group ranked consistently second to the Methodists during the nine-year period, from the standpoint of numbers, with the exception of one year, 1917-18, when there were more Christians than Presbyterians in school. The no church preference group ranks just below the Presbyterian as a nine-year average.

The report is based upon mere church preference, which in many cases does not involve actual membership. Roman Catholic students have been enrolled every year, with a total of 46 for the nine years, an average of 5 per cent. The highest number in any one year was in the year 1922-23, when there

were 11. There were 10 the previous year. In 1920-21 there was only one. There has been only one Greek Catholic, registered in the year 1923-24.

The report shows a steady increase in the proportion of Presbyterians, although there is no indication that the overwhelming Methodist majority will be overtaken. Last year 395 Methodists gave their preference as Methodist, as compared with 63 in the Presbyterian group and 49 in the no church preference group.

Some of the smaller groups during the nine-year period are as follows: Christian Scientist, 19; Unitarian, 12; Nazarene, 9; Seventh Day Adventist, 9; Jewish, 1; Mononite, 5.

The report takes each individual year by itself. In case a student stayed at the university for four years, he would be counted four times.

The report goes back as far as the year 1916-17. There have been a total of 45 seniors during the entire period without church preference. The greatest percentage in any one year of seniors who were Methodists was 66.48 per cent in the year 1918-19. The smallest percentage of Methodists in the senior class was the year immediately previous, when the proportion was 64.8.
