This year a group of the high school girls supervised by the Y. W. leaders will sing Christmas carols to the shut-ins on Christmas eve. High school girl reserves will sell Christmas seals at the high school and gifts will be distributed to poor and needy children. Two Christmas parties are being planned. During the past week classes in beginning French under the direction of Miss Mildred Christensen and classes in beginning Spanish under Miss Louise Townsend have been organized at the Y. W. 
