## \$400 REALIZED FROM SALE OF CHRISTMAS SEALS

Nearly \$400 has been netted from the first installment of Christmas seal letters sent out by Mrs. F. A. Elliott and her committee who are handling the mail sale of the seals in Salem. Not as many of the seals are being sent out by mail this year as formerly as the committee in charge, headed by Mrs. John E. Brophy, is working to put across a big sale of seals at the booths. The seals are sold throughout the country at Christmas time each year for the purpose of raising funds to prevent and to cure tuberculosis. The money is spent in an organized manner along scientific lines.

A case in Salem which has recently come to the attention of officials is typical of cases throughout the entire nation which are aided through the seal sale. The father, in this family, is confined to the home with tuberculosis. The mother is working to support the family. There is a little child who doctors say is undernourished and on the way to become a victim of the disease. There is a little older child helping after school by odd jobs but he should be sent to the country to get some weight and color. These are the families that are being assisted each time little Christmas seals are used on Christmas packages.

## REPUBLICANS REJECT NYE

Fargo, N. D., Dec. 4.—Gerald B. Nye of Cooperstown, United States senate appointee from North Dakota, should not be recognized by the senate as a republican, the republican state central committee decided here yesterday.

Mr. Nye recently was named by Governor Sorlie to fill the senate vacancy caused by the death of the late Edwin F. Ladd.

In a telegram to party leaders in the senate, the state central committee said that of the upper house seats Mr. Nye, the republican organization should refuse to recognize or admit him as a republican or admit him to the councils of the party.

Party leaders here said that recognition of Mr. Nye as a member of their organization would be an "affront" to North Dakota republicans.

## LA FOLLETTE JR. BOLTS CAUCUS

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Instead of accepting an invitation to confer with republican members of the senate today, Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin today met with the Wisconsin republican insurgent members of the house and afterward it was announced that a statement would be issued tomorrow, "meeting the issue squarely."

Meanwhile the republican committee on committees denied Representative Nelson of Wisconsin, leader of the insurgent group in the last session, his seat on important house rules committee approval was given the action of the republican caucus last March in removing Representative Frost of Wisconsin from the ways and means committee.

## CHIEF DEPUTY PROMOTED TO WARDENSHIP

formerly sheriff of Gilliam county and lived at Condon.

Mr. Dalrymple, the outgoing warden, said today that he has made no plans for the future. He

was appointed warden to succeed Johnson Smith when the latter was removed by the governor because of criticism leveled at the administration on account of many escapes from the penitentiary.

History of New Warden. J. W. Little, the new warden, was born in Gilliam county, near Mayville in 1886. He attended Grass Valley academy and for two years was a student at McMinnville college, now Linfield college, and then completed his education at Portland Business college. During his school days he was prominent in athletics, particularly football.

In 1914 when he was 27 years old Little was elected sheriff of Gilliam county. He was the youngest sheriff in the state at that time and probably was the youngest man ever elected sheriff in Oregon. He served three terms, or six years, as a democratic sheriff in a republican county and during that time was secretary of the state sheriff's association.

In 1921, Little became assistant cashier of the First National bank at Condon and after holding the position eight months resigned to go into the real estate and insurance business, first at Condon and then at Astoria. He was living at the latter place when he was appointed deputy warden of the penitentiary.

Golden's Career. W. E. Golden, the new deputy, was born in Kentucky, in 1878. He lived there 24 years, teaching school about two years. He enlisted in the army during the Spanish war, and after serving his hitch in the army re-enlisted for Philippine service, making three trips to the islands and soldiering there a total of 11 years. In the United States he soldiered at Ft. Leavenworth, San Antonio, the Presidio at San Francisco and other places. During the World war he served overseas for 11 months with the 319th and the Fourth engineers. In all he served 23 years in the army. After his retirement he was again called into active service as assistant in-

Robert Shattuc, 1465 South Church street, and Francis Melr clashed at State and Waverly. The former was stopped when his car was hit in the rear by the latter.

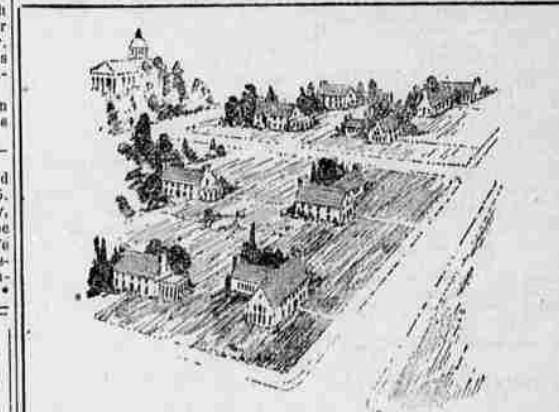
Dale Cheener reports that an unidentified car ran over his motorcycle.
