### EVANS QUILTS AS PASTOR OF LOCAL CHURCH

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No Successor in Sight. No successor is immediately in sight to fill the place left vacant by Rev. Evans. Miss Vivian Whistler, church assistant, will have full charge of church affairs, including pupil supply, until the position is filled.

In his new position Mr. Evans will have full general supervision over the \$100,000 mission program launched by the Christian church in southern California. He will also have charge of expenditures of \$25,000, the proportion to be spent in the section over which he has jurisdiction. An additional \$10,000 of the fund is to be used in the support of Christian college, located across the street from the campus of the University of Southern California at Los Angeles. The balance of the fund will be used through the national headquarters of the United Missions society at St. Louis.

While Mr. Evans has been pastor of the First Christian church here there have been some 650 new members taken in. Missionary gifts have increased from a few hundred dollars annually to more than \$2000 a year. The local church at the present time supports a missionary in Africa, Miss Hattie Mitchell, who works in the Congo district.

Rev. Evans' sister, Miss Rose Evans, who has been living with him at the Christian parsonage here, will go to San Francisco and live with another sister.
