Sale of Christmas Seals Opened Response Is Good

Sale of Christmas seals opened yesterday in the Salem post office and booth sales in various stores and business offices will open next week, under the direction of members of the Salem Woman's club. Throughout the county the sale is being directed by Mrs. John A. Carson, president of the Marion county health association. Knowledge of these seals and Mrs. P. A. Elliott is chairman of the Salem sale with Mrs. John E. Brophy directly in charge of the booths.

Women throughout the county are responding well," said Mrs. Elliott this morning, while tabulating the returns from the mail sale. From 405 letters opened so far, a total of \$453 has been netted.

Christmas seals finance the campaign of the Oregon Tuberculosis association which is specifically designed to meet the need of teaching health. Public health

purposes are put into the field in Oregon. Health teaching is taken into the Oregon schools. Literature is distributed and every known channel of teaching health is employed. It is disregard of the rules of healthy living that permits tuberculosis to continue at so great a menace to human life. Knowledge of these seals and care in their application will eventually overcome tuberculosis.

In 1924, 593 Oregon people died with tuberculosis. Best estimates indicate that probably 5000 are afflicted with the disease. Careful studies show that between the ages of 15 and 40 more Oregonians die of tuberculosis than from any other cause of death and the same is true thru out the United States as a whole. Tentative Budget Shows Increase Of \$69,666 In Taxes

tax increase totals \$19,929.24, and the increase in market road fund is \$5000. This is caused by the fact that the state was able to allot a \$5000 increase in the market road fund to this county, and it was up to the county to match the increase or lose the fund, and it is essential that it keep the fund if it wants to go ahead with its market road program.

Another feature in the increase in the county tax is that shown in connection with market road

bonds, an increase of \$35,063 being shown, which is to be levied to pay interest on bonds under the first bonding program. It was not necessary to levy that amount last year for interest, but it is an obligation that cannot be dodged.

County schools show an increase of \$13,333.70, which includes increases in tuition fund, the per capita assessments and levy generally.

Another increase is for elections and repairs to county buildings, the election increase being necessitated by the fact that an election will be held next year, while none was held this year and it is another unavoidable expense. Repairs are for general necessary work on county buildings.
