Arts League Entertained At Chemawa

One of the most unusual collection of Indian baskets in existence with many pieces that could not be duplicated anywhere, was viewed by members of the Salem Arts League last night when they were entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harwood hall at Chemawa. Mr. Hall, who is superintendent of the Chemawa Indian school, has spent more than forty years in the government Indian service in all parts of the United States and has collected baskets from all tribes and on all reservations.

In the collection are included a number of baskets which can never be replaced. He has a number of enameled baskets made by the San Jacinto Indians in California, all of whom were killed in the California earthquake about twenty years ago. Only a dozen or more of these Indians could make these baskets and the secret was lost with them. A basket made by Ramona, one of the most colorful figures in California's history, is also included in the exhibit. An Indian art expert gave, as a low estimate, a valuation of \$10,000 to the collection.

Captain Stacey, instructor on the faculty of Chemawa, who has spent years in the study of Indian art, gave an illustrated talk before the arts league last night. He showed different designs worked out by the various tribes and stressed the fact that each work of Indian art illustrates a story or a legend sacred to the tribe. To a casual observer each piece is perfect in design but Captain Stacey showed that each piece contains a flaw of some kind. An Indian never attempts to make anything perfect as he believes that when one perfect thing is accomplished he will die.

Indian songs written by American composers were sung during the evening by Miss Anna Petrovich, an Alaskan Indian who is a student at Chemawa. Raymond Haldane, a pupil of Mrs. Ruthyn Turney as Miss Petrovich, also gave several vocal solos. Numbers were given by the girls' octet and the boys' quartette. Louis De Pula gave a reading.

Late in the evening the girls of the domestic science department, with Mrs. Louise Brickell in charge, served a lunch in the dining room to the 45 members of the Arts league in the guest group.

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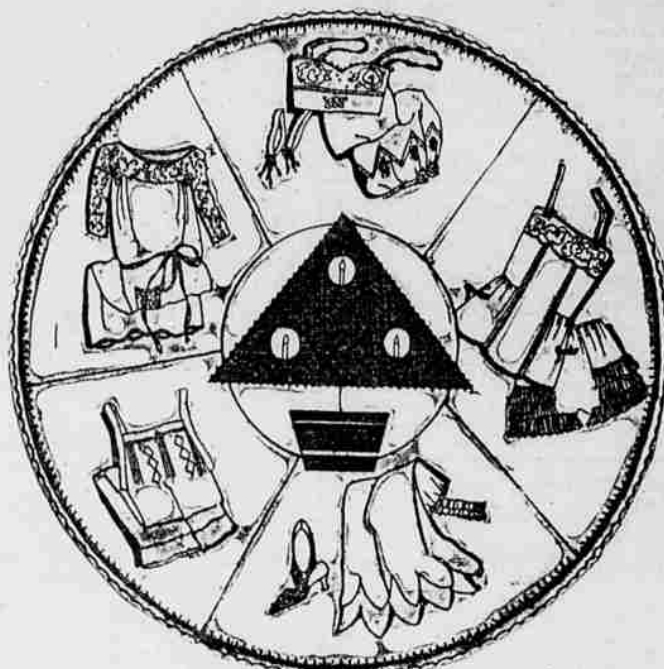
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
