CLUB WOMEN SELLING SEALS AT POST OFFICE

Since modern science discovered that tuberculosis can be prevented and cured the fighting of the "white plague" has been carried on by public health workers throughout the nation. To make any progress worthy of mention it is necessary to enlist the aid of thousands of people. The Christmas seal has come to be the accepted means of raising funds each year to assist families and individuals afflicted with tuberculosis and carry on an educational campaign for prevention of the disease.

With the state tuberculosis hospital within the county the people of Marion county are particularly aware of the seriousness of the disease. With nearly six hundred people dying of tuberculosis in Oregon alone during 1924 and with an estimate that more than five thousand people are afflicted with the disease at the present time in this state, the seriousness of combating the evil is apparent. The people of Marion county are aiding in the fight with the generous purchase of the Christmas seals which are being sold under the direction of the Marion county health association.

In Salem the seal sale is handled by the Salem Woman's club. This week a group of club members including Mrs. W. G. Allen, Mrs. Roy Burton, Mrs. Charles S. Weller, Mrs. C. S. Hamilton, Mrs. P. A.
