The shares of stock will be distributed as follows: First National bank of Portland, 5529; James G. Heitzel for Carl Ulman company, 10,956; Coollidge & McClaine, Silverton, 3322; Roy Morley, 3216; First National bank of Silverton, 3431; Robert Cole, 2690.

Wolf, for many years, was one of the leading hop men of this section. Upon his death it was found that affairs of his estate were so involved that to straighten out the tangled, M. G. Gunderson was named administrator and organization of the Jule Ranch was perfected. This incorporation takes over the holdings of the Wolf partnership estate and will operate them in order to take care of the claims of creditors.

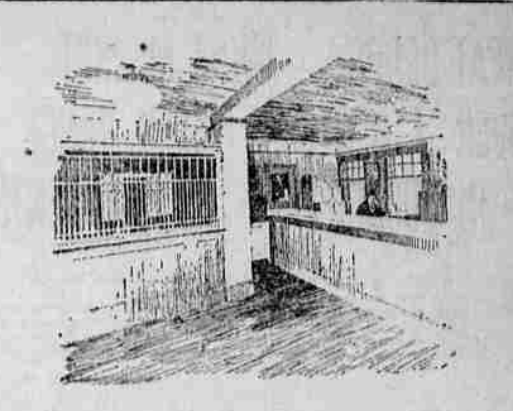
