COURT DENIES WRIT OF CAUSE IN MURRAY CASE

After a hearing in Albany yesterday Judge Percy R. Kelly refused the petition of Will R. King, attorney for Tom Murray, who sought a certificate of probable cause on high to base an appeal to the supreme court. It is understood that King will today present his petition to the chief justice of the supreme court. Should the certificate be denied Murray will be executed on Friday, December 18, for the murder of John Sweeney, prison guard, in the break from the state prison last August.

The bill of exceptions prepared by King was signed by Judge Kelly after an examination showed it to be a true copy of exceptions taken by the attorney for the defense during the trial.

If King succeeds in perfecting an appeal it is understood he will contend that Murray cannot be legally executed until the termination of the sentence he is now serving in the penitentiary, which would be about 15 years. He also will contend it is understood, that some questions asked by the district attorney while questioning a convict witness should not have been allowed by the court. The self-defense plea will also be used.
