Better Health Longer Life

GORGAS MEMORIAL INSTITUTE

(By Arthur H. Ruggles, Provident, H. L. Member Gorgas Memorial Institute.)

Nervous diseases occur somewhat more frequently in women than in men and, therefore, it is important that women, especially, should be informed as to some of the nervous ills that may befall them and learn the lessons of prevention.

Many of the unwholesome nervous traits which are forerunners of later more serious trouble are evident in childhood, and will be dealt with in an article covering that period; but the period from 15 to 21 is a period of development and adjustment which throws an especially severe strain on the nervous system of young girls.

It is in this age period that certain types of nervous and mental disease are most prone to make their appearance. One of the common of these is dementia praecox which may be indicated by acuteness, irritability, suspiciousness, ideas of persecution, slowness of muscular movement, peculiar mannerisms and delusions of a fanciful nature.

When young adults at this age show any of these peculiarities, it is an indication that they need a thorough examination by a specialist, that they need to be kept from emotional excesses, and be given a maximum of outdoor exercise with wholesome companions and interests.

They should not be pushed unduly in their studies or disciplined severely until the report from the doctor has been received.

If your girl gets easily by the adolescent period, it is unlikely that any severe mental upset will occur until the 40's with the exception of a few nervous and mental changes so hand-in-hand with the inevitable changes and often subtle when these changes have taken place. However, the understanding of such conditions is extremely important and the treatment of them by a physician may be imperative. The Gorgas Memorial Institute knows and wishes you to know that a large number of such cases recover. More would if they were given proper understanding and treatment when they occur. Just as many would be prevented if stress and strain could be removed from women at this period.

BANK CLAIMS IS ACTION OF UNFAIRNESS

come a reserve depository is granted," said Haines, "we feel that banks who deposit their reserves with us are going to be penalized, and we demand a change in the attitude of the state department."

Want State Funds

In reply to a question by State Treasurer Kay, J. N. Hart, attorney for the bank, replied that the purpose of the hearing was to find out "why the Portland National bank has not been made a depository for state funds why state banks have been refused permission to deposit their reserves with us and why we are being discriminated against."

Hart read a series of letters that passed between him and Bramwell in which he insisted on knowing why permission to serve as a reserve depository had been refused the bank the bank. He

evaded a direct reply and said "we demand to know now."

Secretary Koser brought up the question whether the banking board had jurisdiction over the question and asking if it were not exclusively in the hands of the superintendent of banks. Hart replied that in his opinion the creature was not greater than the creator and that he believed the board had advisory control of the superintendent. State Treasurer Kay referred to the new banking code, saying that it took from the board about all the power it had except that of appointing a bank charter agent, granting bank charters and approving charters.

Bramwell Replies

Superintendent Bramwell explained that the new code does not change the authority of the board, but that the granting of charters as reserve depositories has always been discretionary with the superintendent.

"It's a d— poor law," commented Governor Davis, "a very poor law in this day and age."

"Have you any other evidence to present," asked Kay, "in support of statements that you have made that would tend to show that Bramwell has been unfair, arbitrary or incompetent and that might cause the board to consider his removal?"

At this Bramwell wanted to know if he was on trial.

"That's what I want to know," said Kay.

"I think they have a right to go ahead and present all they have," added Bramwell. "Then the board can call me in and hear my side."

Country Bankers Testify

Several country bankers were introduced by Mr. Haines to testimony in behalf of the Portland National. They testified that they had been advised not to deposit their reserves with that bank, and the representative of a bank at Gervais said Bramwell had advised him that his reserve would not be counted if deposited with the Portland National bank.

J. H. Davis, cashier of the Portland National, asserted that his banks out-of-town deposits had been cut in half because of Bramwell's refusal to allow it to be a reserve depository. While Bramwell was disputing this the conference adjourned for luncheon.

intrably into the finer grade of goods," stated Mr. Black.

Fiber Proves Good

"I think it inadvisable to tackle the finer grade of goods, or the 'finer numbers' at first. The program outlined is a good one, to start work on the coarser numbers at first, such as cranes, hucks, glass checks and similar products until the help is educated to a point to handle the finer grades. With this education also will develop the education of the farmer in the growing of flax and the manner of handling to the flax which will assure the finer grades."

"At this time, I might say, there is no doubt that sufficient labor can be secured here and educated so that it will be unnecessary to import any outside skilled help, although it might be of assistance to have one or two trained and skilled workers starting in the mill with the other workers, as it might develop the process of education faster. But the mill can be figured on as furnishing labor for local people. A good apt student can be brought along very rapidly in the manufacture of linen."

Linen Outwears Cotton

"One thing that people of the community should be impressed with, and that probably few of them know, not having come into contact to any great extent with linen manufacture. And that is that, conservatively speaking, linen will outwear cotton 10 times, when the two are of equal weight, use and under equal laundry conditions. This has been amply proven and is an important factor in the development of the manufacture of linen products in this

section and this country. In fact linen manufacture in this country is almost negligible and its development here will be of prime importance.

"I estimate that the plant which is projected here will handle about 2500 pounds a day of the fiber as it comes from the scutching mill and machines. That is, about a ton and a half will be used on the heavier grades and about 2200 pounds on the finer grades."

Flax Quality Fine

"The quality of the flax here is as good as any I have seen, either in Canada or on the continent, and I believe there is no reason to fear for either the quality or the quantity here."

Mr. Black reiterated a statement of a few days ago that the length of the flax is by no means vital in linen manufacture, no does the short flax increase the operating costs. "All the short flax does," he stated, "is to make the operator work a little faster. It does not require more operators or it does not increase the cost."
