When the Doernbecher estate left the money for the construction of the big hospital it was expected that the state would appropriate funds to complete the building and equip it. This was not done and the people of the state, under the leadership of a group of prominent Portland men and women, have undertaken the work of raising funds for this purpose. The vanishing party idea was evolved in each of the larger towns of the valley and the state the series has been carried out. Several "lines" were started in Salem, each with five. Afternoon teas have been given here. The beginner of the series asks five of her friends to have tea with her and each of the guests brings a dollar for the Doernbecher fund. Each of the five guests also gives a ten for the fund and each makes four guests. The four each follow asking three guests and so on until the line is complete. In this way many people are reached and the burden is not heavy on any one. The lines in Salem have not yet been completed but it is thought that before Christmas the complete sum will be ready to turn in to the Portland headquarters. The complete list of vanishing tea hostesses in Salem will be published when the lines are complete.
