Woman's Club Hears Health Talk

The importance of proper health education in the prevention of tuberculosis was stressed by Dr. G. C. Bellinger in an address before the Salem Women's club on Saturday afternoon. Dr. Bellinger was the principal speaker of the day.

A Christmas play written by Miss Mary Gilbert, daughter of the superintendent of the boys' training school, was presented to the club women by eight boys of the training school.

Institutions day was observed Saturday and the institutions department occupying a prominent part on the program. After a short talk by the chairman, Mrs. F. M. Erickson short reports were given by various department members on the needs of the different institutions and their impressions of them.

Public health nursing, considered a vital factor in the program of health education and preventive medicine, making much progress in recent years, is a major activity of the Oregon Tuberculosis association.

Fourteen Oregon counties now have one or more regular full time health nurses. The list includes Clackamas, Clatsop, Coos, Columbia (Red Cross nurse), Douglas, Deschutes, Hood River, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Marion, Multnomah, Umatilla, Union and Wasco counties.

That the activities of these nurses cover a wide range is indicated by the following typical report, taken from the records filed by Miss Leah Jennings, one of the Jackson county nurses. In seven weeks 890 school children were inspected. Of the number, 250 were 10 per cent or more underweight.
